The local wheat traders seem to be over alarmed over the foreign situation on the late advance yesterday. The covering of short wheat was on a large scale. Many seemed to imagine that some very important war news had been received from the other side of the ocean. As a matter of fact conditions in the Balkan states are about the same as for two days past. The Liverpool market is up slightly, because of lighter offers from this side. The continent is bidding actively for wheat. No one can estimate the effect of foreign news and the market is likely to be spasmodic in action. So far as the domestic situation is concerned there is nothing to create enthusiasm among buyers cash wheat, Ic to 14c higher.

Reports of frost damage to late corn were more numerous yesterday and yet the strength in the market was more largely due to the upturn in wheat than it crop news. Weather conditions are fine. There is uncertainty about the amount of corn which will be offered and shipped for December and this leads many to expect an increase in the premium for that month over May. In a general way, the supply of corn is so large, with restricted feeding demands, that the trade and the public are inclined to leak to the selling side of May contracts.
