The alumni in session now at the Rome hotel for the third annual clinic has empowered the president to appoint a committee to devise ways and means to raise the necessary funds for such a building. The building is to cost not less than \$30,000. The committee is not yet appointed.

McDonald, '05, Superior, Wyo., vice president; Dr. J. C. Decker, '04, Belleville, Kan., second vice president; Dr. R. A. Dodge, '01, Omaha, secretary-treasurer. Two Ordinances Are Prepared on the Sub-Sidewalk Tax Case

SUGAR IS NOW SOME CHEAPER

Coffee Advances and May Go Still Higher and Eggs Advance.
CHEESE GOES UP TWO CENTS
 Many Varieties of Vegetables Are Leaving the Market—Apples Are Much Cheaper Than Last Year.
 With the change in prices of things during the last week, kitchen commodities have kept an even balance. Sugar has declined in cost to the consumer 10 cents and is now retailing at 19c for nineteen pounds. Coffee has advanced a cent and is expected to go another cent higher. Flour remains strong in the market, selling 100 pounds at \$2.40.
 Eggs also have advanced a cent and are priced at most stores at 24 cents a dozen, while butter is the same, 34 cents a pound for the best. Country creamery butter may be had for 30 cents a pound. With better varieties has gone up 2 cents.
 Several varieties of vegetables are leaving the market and consequently are high in price. Beans, wax and green, are being shipped in from Arkansas. They retail at 10 cents a pound. Green peppers are priced 25 and 40 cents a dozen. Cauliflower sells at 12c cents a ounce. Grape fruit is priced at 7c and 10 cents each. Celery roots, for soup, are 10 cents each. Celery bunches, for a dime and oyster plants are prices the same.
 Other vegetables are prices around six bunches for a nickel, such as carrots, beets, turnips, radishes and green onions.
