W. L. WILSON DIES AT HIS HOME AT NEBRASKA CITY
William Lewis Wilson, president of the Nebraska City National bank, died at his home in Nebraska City Friday evening following a paralytic stroke the previous Saturday. Colonel Wilson came to Nebraska City in 1872 and has followed

banking since early manhood. Born in Berwick, Pa., in 1840, he saw some hard service in the civil war as an officer of the 142d Pennsylvania volunteers, having a horse shot under him at Chancellorsville and serving as an aide to General Abner Doubleday at Gettysburg.
