**Supreme Court is Absolutely Right, Says A. W. Jefferis**

A. W. Jefferis, who was in the fight for the republican electors on the ballot, expressed his pleasure at the decision of the supreme court.

"I think it is absolutely right," he said. "I don't see how they could have found otherwise. From the standpoint of square dealing, as well as from that of good citizenship, it must be apparent that it never was intended that six men selected as trustees of a party should turn their backs upon the members of that party who desire to express their opinions and ideas regarding the policies of conducting a national government as distinguished from a state government."

"The nomination of six men by the progressive party who had been nominated by the republican party as its candidates for electors and their acquiescing therein and permitting themselves, voluntarily or otherwise, to be made its candidates, placed them in two positions of trust which were inconsistent and incompatible. If permitted to remain upon both tickets they would have been enabled to hold themselves out to the state

and the nation in a dual and antagonistic capacity, in effect saying to each party, 'Elect us and we will vote for your candidates for president and vice president.' 'The republican state central committee, recognizing the injustice of such a contention from the standpoint of moral and legal principles that have existed since the days of Lord Bacon, proceeded to act and the justice of the action has been proven by the finding of the Lancaster county court as well as by the unanimous decision of the supreme court.'

**Sunderland Gives Totem Pole to City**

Ralph E. Sunderland, of the firm of Sunderland Bros., has presented to the Omaha public library the totem pole which he brought back from Alaska a few years ago. Ever since its advent into civilization the totem pole has stood outside the office of the firm. It is one of the few real poles that was ever brought into the United States. Mr. Sunderland secured it at Wrangell after much trouble through the assistance of the Rev. H. B. Corser, a pioneer Alaska missionary. The pole was sent direct from Alaska to Louisville where it helped secure the convention of Ad clubs for this city.
