BALLOT IS A LENGTHY AFFAIR

Over Eight Feet of Names to Be Gone Over and Marked.

FIVE GROUPS OF ELECTORS

Sixty-Two Deputy Assessors on the List, from Which Voter is Supposed to Select Thirty-Two—Five Amendments.

The ballot which the Omaha voter will drag into the booth with him when he goes to vote next Tuesday, will be something over eight feet in length. A few samples are out now. Just for example, he will be confronted near the head of the ballot with a list of sixty-two deputy assessors from which he is supposed to choose thirty-two. There are three candidates for justices of the peace, five candidates for constables to fill vacancies, three candidates for county commissioners, three for county assessor and three for county attorney. Out of a list of 32 candidates for state representatives the voter is to choose twelve. Out of fifteen candidates for state senators, the voter is to choose five. For congressman, senator and state offices, forty-one candidates will stare him in the face. Five sets of presidential electors contribute the

group from which the voter is to select one set of eight. They are designated by party designation and in the following order: Republican, democrat-peoples independent, socialist, prohibition, progressive. The republican electors, which are the Taft electors, head the list of the elector candidates. Heading everything on the ticket are the five proposed constitutional amendments, providing for the initiative and referendum, fixing the term and salary of members of the legislature, creating a board of commissioners of state institutions, providing for general election once in two years, providing for cities or more than five thousand to form their own charter.

Two Big Alienation Suits Are Started in District Court

Suits for \$20,000 damages for alienations of affections of their husbands were filed in district court by two women. Kate Singer, wife of Abraham Singer, began an action for \$20,000 damages against her husband's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Singer. After their marriage, she alleged, she and her husband began keeping house in rooms rented from the elder Singers. The husband's parents conceived a dislike for his young wife, says Mrs. Singer the younger, and her husband's love for her gradually waned until life with him became almost unbearable.

Mary Brown, wife of Elliott Brown, of West Newton, Pa., began an action for \$20,000 damages against Ida Douglas of Omaha, her husband's sister. She alleges that after her marriage to Brown the sister wrote Brown a letter that turned her husband against her. She came to Omaha to start her suit.

ADVOCATES CITY BEAUTIFUL

Mayor Dahlman Plans Beauty in Address to Real Estate Exchange.

WANTS BUILDINGS UNIFORM

Says that Skyscrapers Are Undesirable in a City and that Buildings Should Be Erected with Idea of Beauty.

Suggestions of naming a commission to work out problems of city planning for Omaha and of calling a special meeting of citizens to consider such plans were made by Mayor Dahlman to the Real Estate exchange at its weekly meeting in the Commercial club rooms. The mayor read letters from city planning experts which contained information about what other cities have done and are doing in the way of planning to avoid congestion and to beautify their municipalities.

He declared his idea of a city beautiful would be one in which beauty is combined with usefulness, where everything in its arrangement carries a suggestion of simplicity with its qualities of convenience and usefulness.

He mentioned the street crossing at Twenty-fourth and Leavenworth streets, as a place which some day would have to be widened to accommodate traffic and referred to other instances in Omaha's present plan which could be bettered by being changed to conform with a general city plan. Mayor Dahlman said that skyscrapers are undesirable in a city; that buildings should be erected with some idea of uniformity and their locations arranged harmoniously. Streets, he said, should be
