The choir of the First Congregational church will give its first musical service of the season on Sunday evening, November 2, under the direction of Dr. Frederic C. Freeman.

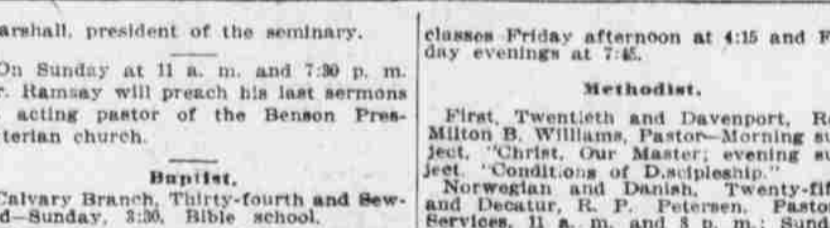
Rev. Milton B. Williams will deliver a series of sermons at the First Methodist church, as follows:
