VOTERS' VOICE TODAY CALLS HALT TO FIGHT WAGED BY BIG THREE

(Continued from Page One.) statement was met with general denials from the republican state leaders. From Governor Wilson and from his New York headquarters came further admissions to democratic leaders to get the voters to the polls, so that the maximum democratic vote would be cast.

The extent to which the socialist party, with Eugene V. Debs as its presidential candidate, will cut into the vote of Taft, Roosevelt and Wilson has become a matter of lively conjecture in the committee headquarters of the latter candidates. The progressive leaders assert that the socialists will poll a heavy vote, drawing largely from the republican and democratic ranks.

In the majority of states the polls will open between 5 and 7 o'clock tomorrow morning. Reports will not be available from any sections until after 5 o'clock (eastern time) in the afternoon and comprehensive returns from any state or congressional districts probably will not be had before 9 or 10 o'clock tomorrow night.

Washington in House is Broken. WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—The death of Representative George H. Utter of Rhode Island apparently breaks the deadlock in which the house of representatives would find itself if it were called on to elect a president.

Up to the time of Mr. Utter's death the house was equally divided. Representation of twenty-two states was democratic, twenty-two republican, and the delegates of four remaining states were equally divided between republicans and democrats.

Three Women Are On State Tickets In Washington

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 4.—Next to the governorship the point of interest in the election tomorrow is the office of superintendent of public instruction for which three women and one man are candidates, with one of the women practically sure of election.

The republican, democratic and socialist parties nominated women for the office, and the progressive party tried to find an available woman candidate and, failing nominated a man. The republican candidate, Mrs. Josephine Preston of Walla Walla, has made a skillful campaign and her election is thought to be assured.

The progressive state ticket is handicapped by having no woman on it. To atone for this fault Helen J. Scott, heads the list of Roosevelt electors. The socialist party outdoes its rivals in recognition of the feminine voters. The socialist candidate for governor is Miss Anna Maley and candidates for public instruction also are women, while three women are on the Debs' electoral ticket. Many women are candidates for the legislature.

Ryan's Trips Are Traced by Letters

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 4.—Frank M. Ryan's trips about the country, about which the government charges were made partly in connection with explosions while he was president of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, were traced in letters produced at the "dynamite conspiracy" trial here today.

TAFT SUMMARIZES POSITION

Reasons Why Republican Party is Entitled to Support. ADMINISTRATION A SUCCESS. Deficit of Fifty Millions Changed to Surplus of More Than Thirty Millions During Last Four Years.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—President Taft issued the following statement here today shortly before his departure for Cincinnati: "On the eve of the national election it is suitable that a short summary should be made of the reasons why the republican party for four years has been responsible for the administration of the government and has left a record of success in effective and efficient executive administration and of legislative accomplishment that is not surpassed by any administration since the war.

Black Hand Charge Against Iowa Man

IOWA CITY, Ia., Nov. 4.—(Special Telegram.)—Charged as being one of the ring leaders of the Bolon black hand gang which has threatened the John L. Adams family for the last two years, Carl E. Osborne of West Liberty, has been arrested and brought here by United States Deputy Marshal M. I. Healy of Cedar Rapids. Osborne is accused of participating in four black hand threats.

Iowa Boy is Shot by His Brother

NEW HAMPTON, Ia., Nov. 4.—While hunting yesterday afternoon Carson Stuke was accidentally shot by his older brother. The charge entered his back, tearing a large hole. He died almost instantly. Young Stuke was a sophomore in the New Hampton high school.

Four Gunmen Are Identified by Coupe

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Thomas Coupe, one of the witnesses of the Rosenthal shooting, who was brought from England too late to testify at the trial of Lieutenant Becker, will be placed on the stand in the trial of the four gunmen, "Gyp the Blood," "Lefty Louie," Whitey Lewis and "Dago Frank." Coupe is one of four witnesses who are expected to identify the gunmen positively, the others being Shapiro, driver of the gray "murder car," Stanton, an engineer, and Krause, a waiter. Shortly after Coupe came back from England, he was taken to the criminal courts building and placed near a door leading to Justice Goff's court, it was learned today. He could see the gunmen passing in and out. According to today's announcement he looked the four over and recognized them as the occupants of the "murder car."

METHODIST BISHOPS ASSIGNED TO SPRING WORK

TOLEDO, Nov. 4.—Assignment of bishops to preside over conferences in districts where spring conferences are to be held during the months of March, April and May of next year were announced by the board of bishops of the Methodist Episcopal church today. Spring conferences of 1913 number about one-third of the total number of Methodist conferences. Fully two-thirds of the conferences are held in the fall. Details for district conferences are designated by the general conference.

Huggins will manage the St. Louis National league baseball club next season, succeeding Roger Bresnahan, dismissed, according to an announcement of one of the directors of the club today. "We have reached an agreement with Mr. Huggins," said the director, "and while he has not signed a contract, he has agreed to take up the reins immediately." Huggins had a long conference with Mrs. Helen Britton, chief owner of the club and her attorney, today. Huggins, when he left the conference said: "I have been eager to be a manager and I'm glad I have succeeded."

SENTENCE OF PRIVATE BEECHAM COMMUTED

At the trial the court took the view that the crime was unpremeditated and held that under the Spanish law the circumstances did not warrant the infliction of the death penalty.

CANADIAN PACIFIC CLERKS BEGIN STRIKE

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 4.—A strike which may affect 5,000 clerks and stenographers employed at the various stations and offices of the Canadian Pacific railroad Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees, the organization of office and station workers, said its members would be on strike through the system by noon and that the men at nearly all the small stations already were out.
