Bulgarian army to concentrate for an attack on the Turkish capital. The Reichspost correspondent says that the brilliant co-operation of the Bulgarian commanders combined with the heroism of their troops is bringing to the Bulgarians fresh successes daily.

An attempt made by the Turks to take up a position again to the north of Serai and at Tchoris, in order to cover the retreat totally failed, as also did the intervention in the fight to the east of Viza by Turkish troops who had advanced through Sultan Bagiche.

The enormous exertions and great sacrifices entailed on the Bulgarian troops by the blows struck at Kirk-Kilissah and Lule Burgas have naturally evoked a temporary need for repose, but this will not bring the operations to a standstill for any length of time.

German Cruiser Sails.

KIEL, Germany, Nov. 4.—The German armored cruiser Goeben sailed this morning by way of Skagen and the protected cruiser Breslau will follow this afternoon by way of the Kiel canal.

France Refuses to Lead.

PARIS, Nov. 4.—The French government has refused the Turkish government's appeal for it to take the initiative in bringing about an intervention of the powers to stop hostilities and impose an armistice on the Balkan states.

TURKS ARE STILL HOPEFUL

Nasim Pasha Says He Can Hold Last Line of Forts. CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 4.—Nasim Pasha, the Turkish commander-in-chief, is still confident of his ability to hold the lines of Tchataltai against the Bulgarians, in spite of the fact that mediation of the powers has been invited in order to obtain an armistice while negotiating for peace.
