#### BIG TRADE SHOW PLANNED

To Promote Co-Operation Between Retailer, Consumer, Manufacturer.

STATE-WIDE IN ITS SCOPE Auditorium Has Been Secured for the

Big Exposition, Which Promises to Be Greatest Ever Attempted Here.

It having been decided that the 1913 convention of the Pederation of Nebraska Retailers shall be held in Omaha in March, thus bringing face to face the Omaha manufacturers with the retail dealers, a movement was set on foot recently to premote a home products exposition that should take place at the

A few weeks ago the scope of this movement was extended through the efforts of the Omaha Manufacturers' essociation, to organize through a meeting of state-wide manufacturers November 14 and 15 in the city of Omaha. It is expected that over 500 manufacturers of Nebraska will be in Omaha at that time. They will confer, not only with the Omaha Commercial club officials, but also with the officers of the Federation of Nebraska Retailers. A better effort n the co-operation, a more thorough knowledge of conditions of trade, greater amount of enthusiasm, belief and faith in home-made products will thus

be brought about. Plan Reautily Endorsed.

Some six weeks ago a delegation of officials of the Federation of Nebraska Retailers appeared before the Omaha Manufacturers' association, set forth plans for a great big trades exhibit of Nebraska made goods and asked for endorsement and co-operation of the local manufacturers' association. This was willingly granted and a committee consisting of Messra. Fodres, Paimer and Eggers was appointed to assist the retailers in making a success of such an ex-

Realizing, however, that the majority of the manufacturers desired also at the same time that they made an exhibit to the dealer to reach the consumer in the some practical form and demonstrate the "Know Nebraska Goods' more extensively. the management of the proposed show decided to make this a grander, greater and much more educational exposition.

Details Are Perfected. The final details and arrangements for the "Made in Nebraska" show were perfected last week through a meeting between Messrs, C. E. Beinert of Wymore, president; G. W. Darner of Lincoln, vice president, and J. Frank Barr of Omaha. secretary, on the part of the Federation of Nebraska Retailers, Penn P. Fodera, and his committee on the part of the Omaha Manufacturers' association and other interested parties.

At this meeting it was definitely decided to hold a "Made in Nebraska" show from Tuesday, March 4, to March 15 in the Omaha Auditorium, the first four days of it being largely given over to trade sales, and to receptions to the several thousand retailers who will be present at that time; the exposition, however, catering principally to the general public. 
