GOV. WILSON IS THANKFUL

New Jersey Executive Issues His Annual Proclamation.

CLASS BANQUET FRIDAY NIGHT

President-Elect Will Be Entertained by Fellow Students at the University Club in New York City.

PRINCETON, N. J., Nov. H - As govrnor of New Jersey President-elect Wilson today issued his annual Thanksgiving proclamation, drawing attention to the conduct of the political campaign just closed "without violence or passion." The proclamation said:

Another year of peace and prosperity has passed by. The life of the state and of the nation has been undisturbed by war or pestilence or disaster of any kind. We have been free to choose our own ways and have gone through the varied action of a great political campaign without violence or passion. The hope of our people has arisen with an increase of their life, and God has been very giacious to us in all His dealings.

Banquet Friday Night. Members of the class of 1879 of Princeton, Governor Wilson announced today, have arranged to give him a dinner at the University club in New Pork Friday night. It will be a private affair, but will bring together one of the most distinguished classes that has graduated from Princeton, Besides Governor Wilson some of the prominent members of the class include Mahlon Pitney, associate justice of the supreme court of the United States; Cleveland H. Dodge, the banker; Cyrus H. McCormick, president of the International Harvester company; Dr. A. Woodruff Halsey, president of the board of foreign missions of the Presbyterian church; Robert Bridges, a magazine editor; Lynn Helm, president of the California State Bar asociation and member of the executive committee of the American Bar association; Robert H. Mc-Carter, formerly attorney general of New Jersey; Dean William F. Magie of Congressman Charles Tal-Princeton: cott of Utica, N. Y., and a number of others who have become prominent in their respective communities.

The class has contributed a dormitory to the university and its individual members have been among the chief financial supporters of the institutions. The dinner will be the first occasion on which the class has individually honored Woodrow Wilson since he entered public life. When he was president of the university it fitted up a suite of rooms in "Seventy-Nine hall" for his office.

"The Italian government would be acting contrary to its usual perspicacity and solicitude for its most valuable national interests if it persisted in demanding that Montenegro should eliminate from its military operations the port of San Giovanni Di Medua and the city of

He added: "According to the understanding reached by the whole of Europe the territorial status quo has ceased to exist and consequently Italian engagements toward Austria in regard to the political status quo of Albania have inpsed.

Porte Decides to Vield CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 18 - (Midnight.)-That the Porte has entered into direct negotiations with Bulgaria for an armistice is confirmed.

Nazim Pasha, the Turkish commanderin-chief, has received instructions to open communication with the Bulgarian generals and he has sent an envoy to the Bulgarian headquarters.

The Porte appears resolved on this course, owing, on the one hand to the delay of the powers in handling the mediation proposal, and on the other hand, to the divergence of views the proposals have occasioned among the powers. The Porte according to official circles is unwilling to add to the existing embarrassment of the powers.

It is understood here that only four of the powers agreed to submit the mediation proposal, while two, presumably Austria and Germany, abstained from participating. In these circumstances the Porte elected to apply direct to the principal belligerent, Bulgaria; and there is reason to believe that the same course will be adopted in the negotiations for the
