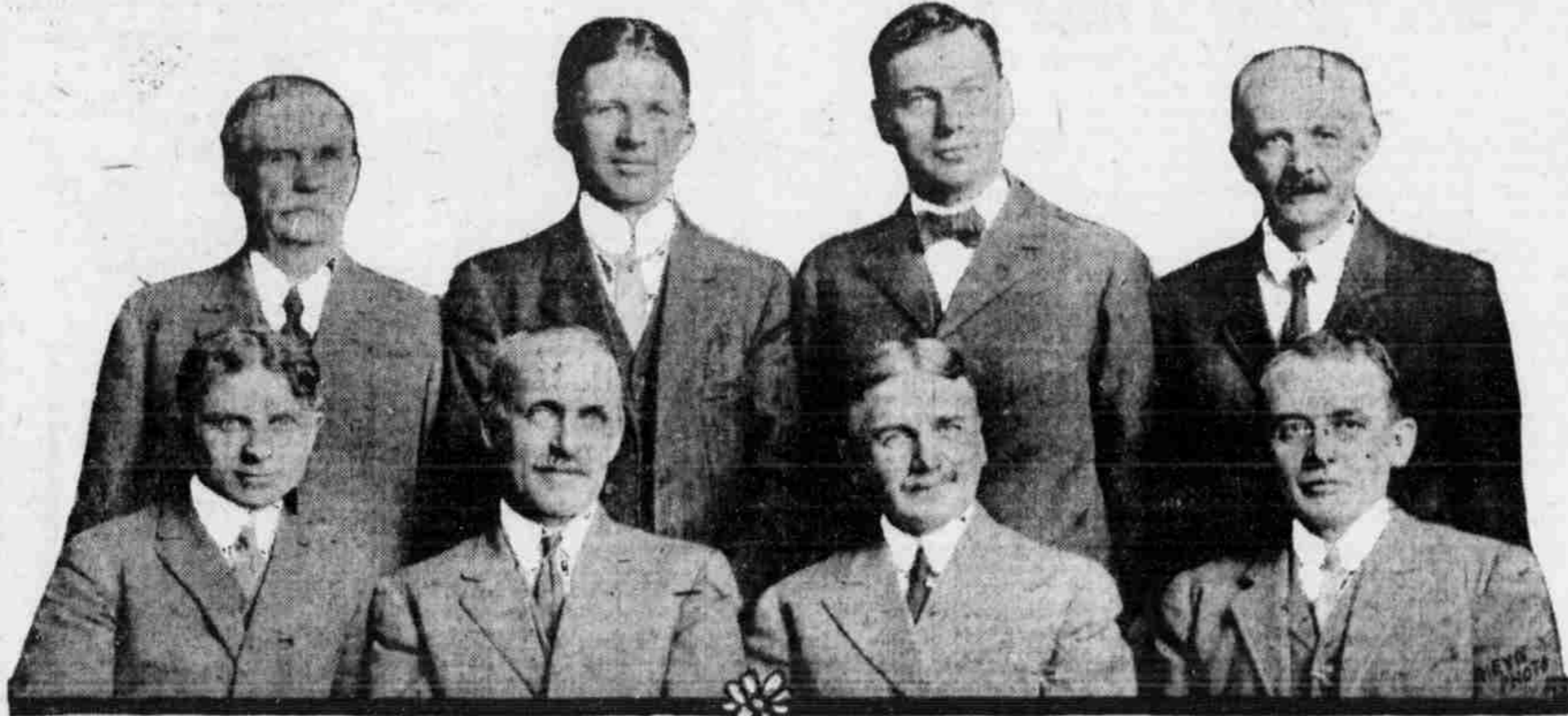

### GIVES SUBJECT MUCH STUDY

He is heard with deep interest by members of Commission who are framing a liability measure for Nebraska.

P. Tecumseh Sherman, who is an expert on workmen's compensation and employers' liability acts as they are enforced in various states in America and abroad, met yesterday morning at the Commercial club with the special commission which is framing a compensation act for Nebraska.

Mr. Sherman gave the commission some of the ideas he has gleaned from much study of the subject and discussed with them the proposed bill which they have framed for Nebraska.

The ideas which he gave were given the Nebraska manufacturers in convention at the Rome hotel during the afternoon.

All of the commission which was appointed by the governor to frame the act for Nebraska are in Omaha with the exception of Mr. Evans of Kansas.

### Cattleman Rises by Sticking Fast to Nebraska Land

A tramp in Pennsylvania in 1873, a homesteader in Grant county, Nebraska, in 1883; a large cattle ranchman owning 2,000 acres of land, leasing 2,000 more, and shipping hundreds of fat cattle to the South Omaha market in 1912, is the record of F. P. Moran of Whitney, Neb., now in Omaha. Moran is in Omaha now to buy more cattle in order to feed up the vast amount of hay he put up on his land during the last summer.

"When I went to Grant county from Columbus, Neb., in 1886," said Moran, "I was urged by my friends in Platte county not to settle there. They told me it was a bad country, that bad men were running loose there, and it was true to some extent. But I went in spite of their advice. It was a pretty rough country at that time. We drove on there from Columbus in a prairie schooner. For two years after I settled on my claim I had to go to North Platte for my mail. That was eighty miles. It was tough to live that way in those days. But those of us that stuck to it have something to show for it now."
