Foot ball battles today hold more interest than those of any Saturday since the opening of the season. In the Missouri valley conference and the "Big Nine" the meetings of Nebraska and Kansas end of Minnesota and Wisconsin will practically settle the championship of those two foot ball divisions. In the east the meeting of Yale and Princeton will decide whether the Blue is to go against Harvard a week hence with a clean slate. If the Blue should lose it would eliminate its chances of getting the championship. The meeting between Nebraska and Kansas will be the nineteenth in the history of these great rivals, and the battle is sure to be hard-fought throughout, with chances favoring a Nebraska victory, since the Cornhuskers have showed up to splendid advantage in all games this fall; while the Jayhawkers have been linked on three occasions. A victory for the Cornhuskers will give them a clean slate for the season in the conference contests.

The Jayhawkers are to meet the Cornhuskers, however, with an eleven that has been strengthened in several ways over the team that played in the other games of the fall. Three or four players who have not been in the game since early in the autumn are in the present

lineup. Martin, who was injured in the Kansas-Aggie game, is back. Hatcher, 150-pound guard who has not seen a game since the Drake battle, is again ready for battle. Bramwell, one of last year's tackles, is also fit for the fray again.

Coaches Work with Kansas.
 Five or six coaches have been engaged in turning the Kansas players into shape. The foot ball men have been drilled in deceptive forward pass plays, in the famous Minnesota shifts and in every sort of play that is expected to gain ground against the Cornhuskers.

Nebraska is the favorite because of its showing in other games. It presents what is probably the best backfield in the west. Its line has been very weak all fall and is likely to have a hard time in steepling its defense for the shift plays. Nebraska will enter the game feeling that its team should win, and it probably will, but the fight will be a fierce one. Minnesota and Wisconsin are attracting great attention by their meeting. Wisconsin has been doing fine this fall and appears to have a wonderful eleven. Minnesota did not get to going well until the season was fairly started, but its recent work has shown Williams to have turned out a strong team. The Gophers are, for the most part, green players, while the Badger eleven is composed of veterans. Minnesota rooters are trusting

to the wonderful coaching work of Williams to win, and if the Gophers do get a victory it will be because of this teacher's great coaching strength.

Chicago and Illinois will play an even contest, with Illinois pushing the Maroons to a hard finish. Chicago will have no easy task in winning, and must play better ball than it did against Northwestern, or else it will lose. Iowa and Ames clash at Ames, with Iowa the favorite. This contest will prove a hard game for each eleven.

Missouri plays Washington, and with several men crippled, will have to play great ball to win. The Tigers are lucky some of their men for the Kansas game next week and will try to preserve their energies. They should win. Drake will not use all its regulars against Grinnell and will be satisfied simply to win. It is holding in for the Ames game next week. Michigan meets Cornell in a game that the Wolverines should win. St. Louis expects an easy time with Marquette, and Creighton should lick Terkio.

In the east, Yale will meet the Tiger in Jungletown, and the game promises to be a closely fought battle, with the Princeton backs causing the Blue all kinds of trouble. Yale will be lucky to win by a small score. Princeton is very strong and may lick the Bulldogs. Harvard goes against Dartmouth and

will have no easy time, though it now is rated as the best foot ball machine in the country. The Green players are a hard fighting team and will cause the Crimson no end of trouble.

Penn tackles Carleton and may spring another Michigan surprise, though the Indians are so fast that they may run up a large score. The Army should win from Tufts. Syracuse expects to whip Colgate, and Brown looks for an easy victory over Lafayette.

FORT OMAHA BAND PLAYS AT ALL FOOT BALL GAMES

Omaha amateur foot ball fans have been treated to an innovation this season in the way of music with the games. At Fort Omaha each Sunday music is furnished by the Fort Omaha band of fourteen pieces.

Major Hartmann has received many letters from amateur fans, complimenting the management on this treat, and he has announced his intention of continuing the concerts for the balance of the season.

HEAVYWEIGHT WRESTLERS TO STAGE A TOURNAMENT

Ag "All Omaha Wrestling tournament" is being planned for early in December by J. M. Gillan, manager of the Auditorium company. It is his intention to pull the tournament off on two different nights. On the first night everything but the finals will be staged.

The list of wrestlers consists of eight Omaha heavyweights. Among them are Jack Meyers, Johnny Holden, Charlie Jensen, Bill Hokuf, Tom McCabe, Charles Peters and Wasson. With this array of talent Gillan expects to pull off something great.

On the first night six matches will be staged. Straws will be drawn and the men pitted against each other. The winners of the first four events will draw straws again and two more matches staged. This will eliminate all but two men, who will be matched against each other on a separate night. They will be the main attraction and several preliminaries will be put on. That the attraction would prove a popular one is manifested by the men who have talked the matter over with Gil-

lan. There are several wrestlers in Omaha who claim to be superior to these, but have not been able to come together. This tournament will pit the very best local talent against each other and the winner will have the right to be called the champion heavyweight wrestler of Omaha. No one but heavyweights will be allowed to participate.
