Sue for Broken Leg—A petition asking for damages to the extent of \$10,000 from the Merriam & Millard company and the Missouri Pacific railway company, was filed in the federal court by Ole Jensen, who asserts he suffered a compound fracture of the leg on March 15, last, when he slipped on some ice along the tracks and in front of Merriam company's building at Eighteenth street and the Missouri Pacific tracks.

Divorced Pair Remarry—Oliver E. Carlisle of Kansas City, Kan., and his former wife, Mrs. Marie C. Carlisle of South Omaha, were licensed by Marriage License Clerk Charles E. Furry and remarried today. Mr. Carlisle is 30, his wife 44. The pair were divorced in Kansas about a year ago. Mrs. Carlisle went to South Omaha to live. The pair began to correspond shortly after the divorce and a reconciliation was the result.

Steinhart Wants State to Assist the County Fairs

John W. Steinhart of Nebraska City outlined his plan for creating new interest in county fairs in a speech before the Omaha Ad club yesterday noon.

He asked that the club assist in getting before the state legislature at the next session a bill to appropriate \$500 to each county that will hold a fair, provided the county and the town in which the fair is to be held will appropriate duplicate amounts.

Steinhart also suggested that experts from the agricultural department of the University of Nebraska assist in renewing interest in county fairs by attending them and judging exhibits. He said that the proposed bill could be entered as a part of university extension work.

The Omaha Ad club soon will start the series of illustrated lectures on advertising work. The first lecture will be delivered by Charles A. Alden. Harry Kelly, Frank Bultia and Charles Alden were appointed a committee to superintend the presentation of the lantern slide course.

Wharton Prepares Omaha Postoffice for Parcels Post

Postmaster John C. Wharton is preparing for the parcels post which goes into effect on January 1. He is making an exhaustive study of the new order and will be one of the best vested men on the proposition in the country when it is put into effect. He has received a huge map, which is divided into eight zones, circling from Omaha. The first zone includes Omaha and the territory within a fifty mile radius. The second zone takes in 150 miles around Omaha, the third zone 300, the fourth 600, the fifth 1,000 and down to the eighth zone. The rates of postage per pound under the parcels post from Omaha to any point in the first zone will be five cents, the second zone seven cents, the third zone eight cents, and up to the eighth zone which is twelve cents per pound.

SEARS CREDITED WITH ELECTION OF KENNEDY

Last year when the American Turners went to the tournament at Prague, Dr. Peir went along. After the tournament he concluded to remain in Prague one year and do post-graduate work. When the war with Turkey broke out he offered

his services to the Bulgarian government and was employed at a salary of \$100 per month and expenses. He has been at the front since hostilities commenced. His salary he has donated monthly to the Red Cross association. In writing back to Omaha friends he says the cause of the allied forces is just and that they are bound to win.

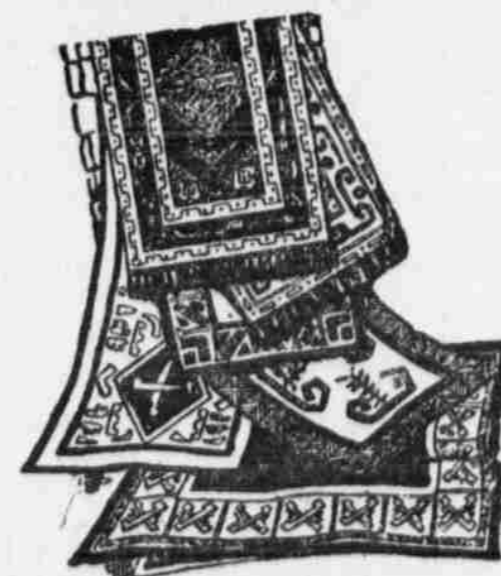
