Examiners Will Pass on All Appli-

cants for Chauffeur Licenses.

Want City to Back Them Up in Efforts of Their Drivers to Collect Tolls from Passengers Who Refuse to Pay,

Police Commissioner Ryder, City Clerk Flynn and Park Commissioner Hummel will compose the board of examiners to on all applicants for licenses as chauffeurs. This board was decided upon by the city commission when objections to Health Commissioner Connell's name was sustained and City Clerk Flynn was named to replace him; Hummel replaces City Electrician Michaelsen, who was at first proposed.

This ordinance, regulating all automoblies used for passenger traffic, will come up for passage next Tuesday. A few amendments were adopted, but the ordin ance as a whole will go through as first presented by the police commissioner. Several taxicab line owners were present to suggest amendments. Discussion over the charge for carrying passengers resulted in a compromise by which the drivers are permitted to charge \$4 per hour for seven-passenger cars and \$3 an hour for five-passenger machines-the rate now in effect.

City Attorney Rine declared one clause of the ordinance made the city liable for the breaking of a contract between the chauffeur and his employer. The clause was cut out.
