AFFAIRS AT SOUTH OMAHA

Water Board Gives Little Hope of New Mains This Season.

LACK OF LABOR AND OF PIPE

City Commissioners and Mayor Hocter Impress Upon Commissioner Howell that Contract Explicitly Calls for Extension of System.

Mayor Hocter of South Omaha, Commissioner Williams, Hartnett and Vana and several citizens have called the Water Board to install eleven hydrants on the proposed sections of South Omaha. The South Omaha city council has ordered these hydrants installed and the streets have been put to the established grade, but the Water Board has made no move to place the hydrants or lay the necessary mains.

Water Commissioner Howell said yesterday at a meeting with the South Omaha men that every available workman and all foremen have been directed to help out the contractor in laying the big cast iron pipe between Omaha and the Florence pumping station. Further, he said the board has no pipe with which to connect to hydrants if they were placed in South Omaha.

The board referred the request to the construction committee, which may authorize the laying of 300 feet of main in one block in South Omaha. Twenty-eighth street from D to E, where a hydrant is most needed. The committee will report next Wednesday. Mr. Howell said there were twenty districts in Omaha where mains had not been installed and all pipe now on hand was "spoken for." Much of the Omaha work may have to be postponed until spring if freezing weather comes soon.

Hocter Replines Contract.

In a few words to the commissioner and to the Water Board last evening Mayor Hocter explained the terms of the contract between the city and the Omaha Water Company. He then went on to explain that when the Water Board took hold of the property it received from the city and accepted water rent as under the old contract, which called for certain improvements by the Water Board. The taking of the money from the city is thought to have been an oversight. The mayor says that after allowing some time to elapse, he called upon Mr. Howell to install certain mains and hydrants in the western and southern sections of South Omaha. Mayor Hocter paid many visits to Mr. Howell's headquarters in a vain attempt to confer with the water commissioner.

Offers to Furnish Labor.

Finally a meeting was arranged and Howell, while admitting the justice of the mayor's claims, pleaded the great dearth of labor and confessed his inability to do the work until he could find sufficient labor. Hocter told Howell that South Omaha would furnish all the labor necessary for the work. Howell then agreed to put in the water mains and hydrants, but evidently forgot all about the matter until Mayor Hocter and Councilmen Williams, Vana and Hartnett called upon him yesterday evening and told him that the work must be done.

Commissioner Healy seemed most impressed by the needs of the South Omaha people and was evidently inclined to come to their assistance, but Commissioner Howell seemed altogether unresponsive to any such calls. The commissioner indicated that it was quite impossible to do any work in South Omaha until after the winter. In the meantime the women and children in the western section of the city will carry water from distant wells and go without fire protection.

The mayor and his council may start a fight for the rights accorded South Omaha in its contract. The fight, if started, will be pushed with sufficient speed to compel the water commissioner to stand by the contract renewed this year, when he accepted the rents of the Magic City under the old terms of the Omaha Water company.

Suspects Revile Each Other.

Seated opposite one another in the office of Chief of Detectives James Sheahan, Jack McDaw, alias Jack Williams and Charles Roberts, colored, reviled one another for a long time. The two men are held on suspicion of having been concerned in recent robberies. Detectives Sheahan and McGuire says that Roberts has been stealing clothes from his neighbors in the vicinity of Twenty-eighth and R streets. The men it is claimed after having appropriated the clothes would visit their victims and condole with them on the loss of their garments. The men are also said to be mixed up in a system of stealing from the packing houses. The police say Williams or McDaw has been the tool of Roberts, who is said to have sent his companion to pawn the stolen articles.

After McDaw's arrest, he attempted to break jail, but was detected by Jailor Corran. McDaw had been taking "vokes" when arrested.

Theater Party Given.

The Gavel club of the South Omaha High school, gave a theater party at the Fern theater last evening after it had met in the high school auditorium, where a debate on the question, "Resolved, That the high protective tariff of the United States is detrimental to the general welfare of the American people," and in which Marie Curti and Albin Hoffman of the negative, defeated Louis Foley and Bryan Nixon of the affirmative. An unusual number attended and so, to give the new-comers a good time, it was decided among the members to give a theater party.

Commissioners Fight Hard.

Beaten at every point in the outer proceedings brought against them Fire and Police Commissioners Ryan and Fivonski, when it became apparent the case would go to trial, Ed P. Smith made his appearance and new W. J. Connell is added to the first two attorneys for the defense. One of the contentions made at Tuesday's hearing was that Mayor Trainor and Chief of Police Briggs were at fault for the laxity of the laws in South Omaha. The commissioners asked that they be relieved from responsibility of having to bear the burdens of the mayor and chief of police. This is in direct contrast to the decision rendered by the supreme court in the Donahue outer suit.

Jefferson Candidate Will Ask Recount

FAIRBURY, Neb., Nov. 21.—(Special)—Steps are being taken by O. R. Jones, defeated candidate for county assessor on the republican-progressive-prohibition ticket, to have the ballots canvassed and a recount made. Mr. Jones was defeated in the recent election by his democratic rival, J. C. Bartel. Mr. Jones received 1,635 votes and Mr. Bartel, 1,596. It is said that in case Mr. Jones should win on a recount of the ballots in Jefferson county, he might lose when the case was appealed to the supreme court on the ground that he was not entitled to the prohibition votes, having failed to file his acceptance of the nomination. Owing to its unusual features, the case is attracting a great deal of attention.

NOTES FROM BEATRICE AND GAGE COUNTY

BEATRICE, Neb., Nov. 21.—(Special)—H. Leon Miller, who, a few years ago, tried to interest a number of Beatrice capitalists in a "blue sky" railroad project, and who was recently arrested at Kansas City for using the mails to defraud, was released from jail yesterday at that place on a \$5,000 bond. Miller says his arrest is all spite work. Before going to Kansas City he operated in a number of Nebraska towns with little success. A number of candidates have already entered the race for the office of superintendent of the feeble minded institute to succeed Dr. W. M. Thomas, who was appointed by Governor C. H. Aldrich. Those who are anxious to get some of the \$10 to be passed around by Governor-elect Morehead are Dr. C. L. Ross, Dr. J. Lewis Webb and Dr. Dearing. Dr. Ross served as superintendent under Shellenberger's administration, and Dr. Dearing was superintendent during Governor Savage's regime.

ITALIAN CHARGED WITH ROBBERY GREEK RELEASED

TABER ROCK, Neb., Nov. 21.—(Special)—Domenico Bellinetti, an Italian-secton hand, who had been under arrest here since Sunday night, charged with the robbery of Bill Pallas, a Greek section hand of \$60 about 7 o'clock Friday night in the railroad yards here, had his preliminary examination before Justice M. H. Marble at 7 o'clock last evening. The action was a state case and the complaint was drawn by County Attorney R. J. Graham of Pawnee City, who presented the case, and the prisoner was defended by ex-County Judge P. A. Barton of the same place.

Grand Master Cuts to Short.

STELLA, Neb., Nov. 21.—(Special)—R. Cain, Jr., grand master of the Masonic lodge in Nebraska, will make a speech at George Washington Masonic lodge in St. Louis on Thanksgiving day, the occasion being the initiation of the seven-hundredth member into the lodge. Grand masters from ten states will be present.

Teacher Unable to Keep Secret.

STELLA, Neb., Nov. 21.—(Special)—When Miss Ella Kuhlman was married to Harry Wambsley at her home at Barada on Sunday, she expected to keep the wedding a secret from her pupils in Prairie Union district near Stella. Monday morning she went to school as usual, but the pupils did not arrive as ordinary. Each carried a piece of china, thus giving her a dish shower. Mr. and Mrs. Wambsley have gone to housekeeping in Shubert.

HAWKEYES READY FOR CLASH WITH BADGERS

IOWA CITY, Ia., Nov. 21.—(Special)—Hopeful of making a better showing against the Badgers than was achieved against the Minnesota team, the Hawkeyes tonight took their last hard scrimmage before the closing battle of the season. The work was marked by many injuries and disappointments, and Hawkeye prospects for a fair showing in the coming encounter slumped several points by the time the practice ended. Pargason, the star halfback, tumbled up at practice time with an ankle so lame that he could hardly walk, causing consternation among the coaches and rooters. Penningroth followed him at the position. Captain Hanson had a bad cold. Advice from Wisconsin are to the effect that the Badger team will come to Cedar Rapids on Friday and work out on the Coe college field that afternoon. The team will remain there Friday night, coming to Iowa City in a special car Saturday. The regular Wisconsin lineup will be used throughout the game.

Prizes for Base Ball Fair.

KEARNEY, Neb., Nov. 21.—(Special)—At the close of the solicitation this evening of business houses of the city at least \$400 worth of supplementary prizes to be awarded in the popularity contest which is to be a part of the base ball fair, had been subscribed. A real estate firm headed the list with a desirable building lot near the State Normal school. The grand prize, an automobile, will be awarded the last night of the week's fair, while the others will be apportioned at the other nights' entertainments.

Shall Street Car Stops Be Changed?

The Commercial Club and the Omaha Auto-Motor (automobile) Club desire to have street cars stop at the near side of the street intersections to take on and let off passengers instead of at the far side, as they do at present. The claim is made by them that it will lessen accidents.

The Omaha & Council Bluffs Street Railway Company does not favor the change for the following reasons:

1. It has been the established practice in this city, ever since street cars have been operated, to stop on the far side of intersections, and it is the established practice in the majority of cities throughout the country today. We feel a change would be confusing to residents and strangers alike.

2. To stop at the near side of intersections would leave the car entrance fifty feet away from the cross-walk, compelling passengers to wade through mud when boarding cars on unpaved streets, and compelling them to wade through snow and slush when boarding cars even on paved streets on many days during the winter.

3. Careful study and investigation fails to substantiate the claim that the near-side stop lessens accidents. The theory of advocates of the near-side stop is that there will be fewer collisions if cars stop on the near side of the street intersections. Our experience and the experience of other street railways is that but few collisions occur at intersections where the car is about to stop. Ninety per cent of all collisions occur either in the middle of the block or at intersections where the car is not about to stop and, therefore, would not be affected by the change, and the remaining ten per cent would still occur, because the chance of a street car colliding with another vehicle when crossing an intersection remains the same whether it is starting up from a stop or coming to a stop as it

crosses the intersection. In either event, the speed of the car would be the same.

IF THE OMAHA & COUNCIL BLUFFS STREET RAILWAY COMPANY BELIEVED THAT THE NEAR-SIDE STOP WOULD LESSEN ACCIDENTS, IT WOULD BE QUICK TO ADOPT IT FOR FINANCIAL REASONS, IF FOR NO OTHER, AS IT IS COMPELLED TO PAY THE DAMAGES.

4. A number of cities, after trying the near-side stop, have abandoned it and returned to the former practice of stopping at the far side. Notable among the cities is the City of Minneapolis where conditions are very similar to the conditions in our own city.

The Omaha & Council Bluffs Street Railway Company desires to do in this matter what the majority of its patrons wishes it to do, and, in order to give its patrons the opportunity to express themselves, will take a vote on the question.

On Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, November 25th, 26th and 27th, passengers on paying their fare will receive from the conductor a ballot, on which they will please indicate their wishes in the matter by marking a cross opposite "FAR SIDE" or "NEAR SIDE" and drop the same in the box on the rear platform of the car.

It should be borne in mind that if the near-side stop is adopted, cars will no longer stop on the far side. Men, women and children alike are entitled to a vote for each fare they pay, and we sincerely hope that all persons will exercise their right to vote each time they ride, so that we may have a fair expression of public sentiment on this question, not only for our own guidance, but also for the guidance of the City Commissioners, who have been requested by the Commercial Club to enact an ordinance requiring us to stop on the near side instead of the far side.

Omaha and Council Bluffs Street Railway Company
