Made confident by their victory over Minnesota and a close game with Michigan, the Dakotans expect to beat Creighton by a larger score than 3 to 2, the final count of last year.

Creighton Dents Get Trampled Beneath Pharmacy Feet

The entire student body of both departments was present and in the excitement crowded onto the field. With the ball within ten yards of the Pharmacy goal in the last quarter the Pharmacy were penalized several times for offside play, the ball finally going to their one-yard line. The Dents did not have the stamina necessary and on seven downs were unable to carry it over.

Thanksgiving is a foot ball day now holds much less interest for the follower of the gridiron sport than it did a few years ago, and this year only a few games of general interest will be played, most of the larger teams of the country having closed their season last Saturday.

Omaha's Thanksgiving menu is the most attractive that this city has had in many years. Creighton will meet the strong South Dakota eleven on Creighton field and the Omaha High will play Chicago at Rourke park.

The Creighton game should be full of foot ball for the Coyotes possess one of the best foot ball machines in the west. Early in the season this aggregation licked the Gophers, and then a month later went against Michigan at ANN Arbor and outplayed the Wolverines, but lost the battle in the last few minutes through a fluke that gave Michigan a 7 to 5 victory.

Creighton is not expecting to win from these fleet northern players, but stranger things than victory under these conditions have happened in foot ball. The game should be a fine spectacle for spectators. The fast Dakota back field will undoubtedly put off many a dazzling play, working end runs for long gains. It will be worth the admission price to see the Coyotes in action. Creighton, however, will not be put aside in any easy fashion. Coach Miller has had his players going through much stiff practice during the last two weeks and has had the assistance of the Creighton alumni.

The players have been in no game for more than two weeks and all are reported in the pink of condition. Creighton always has been able to fight, and those who go out to the local field tomorrow undoubtedly will see some great defensive foot ball on the part of Creighton and much brilliant offensive play by the visitors. It is the chance to see one of the best teams in the west in action, and is also an opportunity to get out and root for Creighton, a school that deserves the support of Omaha because it has been putting this city on the western foot ball map during the last two or three years.

Notre Dame is a favorite over Marquette in the battle scheduled for Chicago. The Michigan Aggies will have a hard fight with Ohio State.

In the east Pennsylvania will probably win by a decisive score because Cornell has a very weak eleven this fall. Brown and Carlisle should fight a great battle, with the Indians, steered by Thorpe, the favorites.

REGAINING FORM AFTER SLUMP

Lane Technical Team to Be Royally Entertained—Commercial and Other Clubs to Swell Attendance.

The Omaha team will be greatly handicapped by the loss of Golden, but a new man has been developed to almost the same style of playing—Harvey Nelson. Nelson is less experienced, but has the necessary stuff in him. The team has been put through heavy signal practice for the last three nights until dusk and entirely recovered from the slump last week. The kicking squad has been held over each night for dropping and kicking from placement. Gardiner is the chief kicker for Omaha and has an average of about forty yards to his punting, while the Lane kicker holding average is slightly lower than Omaha's.

MAGNATES CONVICT FOGEL

Former President of Phillies Barred from National League Councils.

HELD GUILTY ON FIVE COUNTS

Defiant Statement, in Which He Denies Power of League to Punish Him for Alleged Criticisms Made.

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—Horace S. Fogel, former president of the Philadelphia National league base ball club, is forever excluded from participation in the councils of the National league. This was the decision of the magnates of the league after six hours consideration today of the charges that Fogel had made statements reflecting on the integrity of the National league.

Of the seven charges the club owners found the former Philadelphia club president guilty on five and dismissed the other two relating to privileged communications.

Fogel had no sooner read the decision than he countered it with a defiant statement. Before the meetings began he had expected such a decision, he declared.

"The jury was backed against us," he asserted, and he practically told the magnates who had expelled him from their councils that he would pay no attention to their findings.

"I will sell or represent as I please the Philadelphia club in the National league as long as I feel inclined to do so and no one can disturb me from doing so."

Fogel said his attorney, Mr. Shields, had suggested to him after a hour's discussion that he withdraw and resort to the courts on "the grounds that there was a base ball political conspiracy against me to get some one else."

Call It League Politics. "I said," Fogel said, "that I owed it to my base ball reputation, which I consider spotless, to fight the case to the finish. I procured witnesses on each charge to refute overwhelmingly the testimony of the opposition. Mr. Shields still contended that it was a waste of time, and that I still intended we should meet the issue, because I had suggested at the start that an open meeting be held."

"The entire affair is National league politics. Fortunately my constitutional rights are safeguarded in common law and the result of the verdict of the packed jury against me does not affect my property rights in the future. I would simply add that the people of America know my reputation as a builder up and fosterer of base ball and I will stake my reputation for fairness and sportsmanship against that of any man who voted against me on five of the seven charges and who ruled out the other two charges for political purposes."

President Wiler of the Philadelphia National league club refused to vote on the charges against his predecessor on the ground that the league lacked jurisdiction in the case. Wiler said: "I declined to vote, as I stated before, on the ground of jurisdiction. I want to state, however, that while I declined to vote on that ground I endorse all that was said on the subject, because I think that base ball, with the large amounts of capital invested, ought to be run on the highest principles of honor and integrity."

The Chicago team will arrive Thursday morning and will remain probably until Friday night, in the meantime being entertained royally by the Boosters' club and other organizations.

The game will start promptly at 3 o'clock. The Purple and White lineup will be as follows:

The attendance is expected to be the largest and most enthusiastic in the history of the school, for the executive committee of the Ad. Commercial and University clubs have promised to bring large numbers of rooters. The athletic spirit among the pupils has reached such a height that the entire student body is expected to turn out 1,200 strong and root their team to victory.
