SOUTH DAKOTA ANTI-MONOPOLY LAW VALID

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—The constitutionality of the South Dakota anti-monopoly or "unfair discrimination" act of 1897 was upheld today by the supreme court. The act makes it a crime to sell, with intent to ruin competition, a commodity in general use to a dealer in one place at a different price than to another dealer at a different place within the state.

Boys Break Records

Reports already received at the office of the State Board of Agriculture in the boys' corn contest conducted annually by that board indicate that all records for corn production in Nebraska will be broken by the boys this year. Fifteen reports show an average yield of seventy-nine bushels per acre, which is nearly three times the average yield for the state.

World Improve Roads

The Postoffice department has sent a communication to Governor McVick, in which it is stated that a committee has been appointed whose duties it will be to inquire into the matter of making an appropriation of \$500,000 for the purpose of improving the roads in the different states along the lines used by rural carriers.

DEATH RECORD

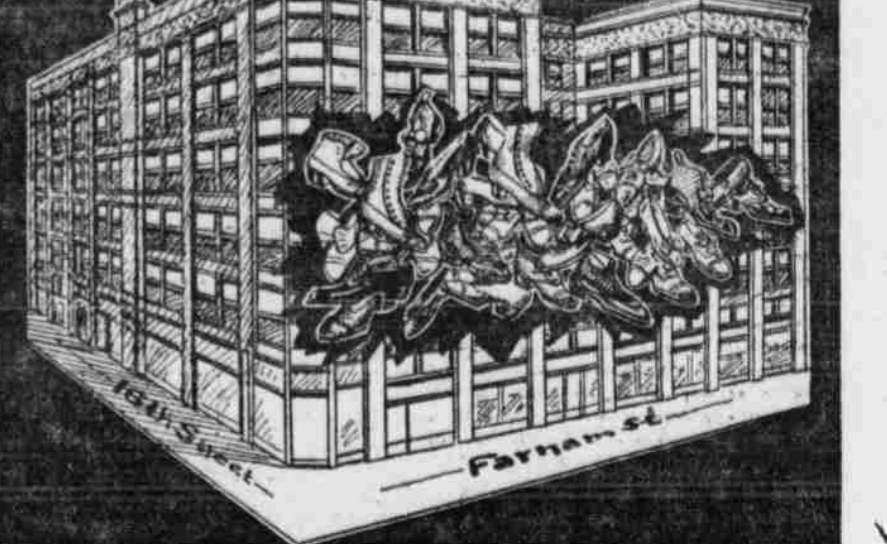
Moses Willard Bartlett.
CEDAR FALLS, Ia., Dec. 2.—(Special.)—Prof. Moses Willard Bartlett died Saturday night at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Austin Burt, Waterloo, where he has made his home in recent years. The deceased was one of the pioneer educators in Iowa. He closed his half-century of teaching in January, 1904, when a Bartlett anniversary was celebrated at the Iowa State Teachers' college. He was born in Bath, N. H., February 25, 1834; received his A. B. degree at Dartmouth college in 1857, honorary A. M. at Iowa college in 1869. He was president of the Iowa State Teachers' association in 1886. He resigned his professorship at Iowa State Normal school June 3, 1904, six months after the celebration of his half century anniversary. His wife was Miss Julia Abbott and she died in Winona, Minn., in 1904. Three children survive—Elmer E. of Waterloo, William A. of Peoria, Cal., and Mary E. of Waterloo. The funeral will be held in Cedar Falls Tuesday.
