

WALKS AND STRIKEOUTS

Chicago Gets Largest Number of Bases on Balls in National.

NEW YORK SECOND IN EACH

Cincinnati Leads Circuit with Lowest Number of Strikeouts—Scheckard Leads League with 122 Walks.

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—Among National league clubs Chicago profited most by the lack of control of opposing pitchers during the 1912 season, according to the official records of bases on balls and strikeouts, issued today at National league headquarters. The Chicago team received 69 bases on balls, an average of 3.88 per game. Cincinnati had the least number of strikeouts, 492, an average of 2.17 per game. New York finished second in both items, receiving 514 passes and having 517 strikeouts.

Scheckard tops the list in receiving walks, outgunning the pitcher 122 times in 146 games. Huggins, with 87 passes in 139 games, also stands prominently. Other good walkers were Paskert, Bescher, Titus, Evers, Carey and Leach. Pitcher Benton did not receive a pass in the fifty games he played.

Moyle is the leader in the least number of strikeouts, 18, in 142 games, an average of one in eight games. Doyle of New York is a close second, with 20 in 147 games. E. McDonald of Boston had the greatest number—91 in 121 games. Marsans, Tinker, Knabe, Meyer, Cutshaw, McLean, Gibson and Killifer have low figures. Zimmerman, who led the league in batting, struck out 60 times and received 33 bases on balls.

The bases-on-balls and strike-out records of the players who participated in forty or more games are given below. Scheckard of Chicago has the unusually high total of 122 bases on balls in 146 games. Huggins, with eighty-seven passes in 139 games, also rates high. Other good "walkers," as shown by the records, are Titus, Moran and J. Smith, of Brooklyn; Paskert, Bescher and Bates, Carey and Evers. Zimmerman secured but thirty-eight passes in 146 games. Kirke, one of the 300 hitters, drew only nine bases on balls in 163 games. Killifer four passes in eighty-five games, and Kelly two in forty-eight games while Pitcher Benton failed to reach first on balls in fifty games. Murray, Fletcher, J. O. Wilson, Campbell, Marsans and Doan are players, who, presumably, would be helped in the batting averages by the exercise of greater patience.
