Legality of Military Court is Attacked

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Dec. 3 - The acts of Governor Glasscock's military commission, which tried and sentenced persons convicted of misdoing in the coal field, were questioned in the supreme court of appeals of West Virginia today when Attorneys for S. F. Nance and L. A. Mays began habeas corpus proceed ings to procure their release from the Moundsville pentientiary, where they are serving sentences of five and two years respectively. The petition says the governor had no right under the constitution to declare martial law and sentences coosed by the military commission were llegal. The arguments will be heard De-


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
