## Sunday Dinner Menu and Toted Recipes

- BREAKFAST.**  
Home-made Scramble.

- Creamed Cabbage.**  
Chop up left over cabbage. Season it. Pour over it little more than enough milk to cover it. When heated stir in a small bit of butter.

**Stuffed Shoulder of Pork.**  
Buy a fresh shoulder of pork, have the butcher bone it, then stuff it, sew it up tight, roll it in a cloth, boil it two hours, take it out of cloth, put it in a iron baking pan and bake it four hours. Before putting it in the oven stick it full of whole cloves all through the rind. It will come out crisp and fine.

**Pea Soup.**  
Pick over and wash carefully one pint of whole peas. Put in an enamel kettle with two quarts of cold water and half a teaspoonful of soda and water and stir to prevent scorching. When they are soft empty that water, rinse and put back on fire with three quarts boiling water, one small onion, one teaspoonful of salt, quarter teaspoonful of pepper and about three-quarters of a pound of salt pork taken from the bones with only a little fat. Put about half a cupful of rice in when the peas boil and just before serving add croutons. Add more water if necessary when it boils down. This will serve eight people.

**Squash Pie.**  
One and one-half cupfuls of sifted squash, two eggs, half cupful of sugar, pinch of salt and a little nutmeg with one pint of milk. Fill crust and sprinkle nutmeg over top, as very little is used in squash.

**Cream of Celery Soup.**  
Two cupfuls of white stock, three cupfuls celery cut in each piece, three cupfuls boiling water, one slice of onion, two tablespoonfuls butter, two tablespoonfuls flour, two cupfuls milk, one cupful cream, salt and pepper to taste.  
Parboil celery in water ten minutes, drain, add stock. Cook until celery is soft and rub through a sieve. Scald onion in milk, remove onion, add milk to stock, add cream and season with salt and pepper.

**Chestnut Dressing.**  
Shell one quart of chestnuts, large size, and scald them until the brown skins are soft. Drain them, turn on to a towel, cover with another towel and rub with the hands until they are blanched. Wash cover with boiling water and cook slowly until tender. Drain and chop fine. Add a level teaspoonful of salt, a statepoonful of pepper, a rounding teaspoonful of butter. Mix and use as a stuffing for a young hen turkey.

**Cranberry Water Ice.**  
To serve with the turkey or to follow closely upon it try cranberry water ice. Pick over a quart of fine plump cranberries and pour on them a teacupful of hot water, not boiling. Cook till soft and reduce to one-half its original quantity and allow it to cool. Add the juice of a good sized lemon, a syrup made of a quart of boiling water and two cupfuls of evaporated sugar cooked until thickens. Stir well and freeze to the consistency of water ice. Serve in sherbet glasses.

**Pumpkin Pie.**  
Three cupfuls of pumpkin, six cups of milk, two eggs, one and one-half cups sugar, one heaping teaspoonful ginger, one heaping teaspoonful cinnamon, one teaspoonful salt and one tablespoonful of flour. Have the oven hot and place pie on the bottom of oven until pie sets, then put on shelf of oven and bake two hours, and have the oven about moderate.

**Sweet Potato Puffs.**  
Boil six medium sized sweet potatoes until tender, then peel and mash, adding one teaspoonful of powdered sugar, two tablespoonfuls melted butter, one saltspoon salt, pinch of paprika and one-half cup chopped nut meats. Beat with a silver fork until very light and then fold in quickly the stiffly whipped whites of two eggs. Pour at once into custard cups, place in a pan of hot water and bake twenty minutes in a hot oven. Unmould when cooked and serve as a garnish for the turkey.

**Hickory Nut Macaroons.**  
Take meats of hickory nuts, pound fine and add mixed ground spices and nutmeg. Make frosting as for cakes, stir meats and spices in, putting in enough to make it convenient; flour the hands, make the mixture into balls, the size of nutmegs, lay them on buttered tins, giving room to spread. Bake in a quick oven. They are delicious.

**Flannel Pancakes.**  
Beat four eggs well, add a half teaspoonful of salt, one level teaspoonful of sugar, three cupfuls of milk and sufficient flour to make a thick batter. Beat hard, add two teaspoonfuls of baking powder, beat again, then bake at once in large pancakes.

**Blaque of Oysters.**  
One quart of fair sized fresh oysters, one quart of rich milk or cream, eight soda crackers rolled, a teaspoonful of beef extract, a saucerful of finely minced celery, two tablespoonfuls of butter, worked into an equal quantity of flour; the yolks of three eggs, a teaspoonful of salt and one-half teaspoonful of pepper, with a sprinkle of cayenne. Chop the oysters, put into a steppan of their own liquor and a pint of water, the celery, beef extract, crackers, salt, pepper and a little parsley. Boil slowly for twenty minutes. Rub through a sieve until all moisture has been pressed through. Return to stove, add milk and simmer again for ten minutes. Set back and carefully stir in the beaten yolks of the eggs. Serve at once.

**Tea Rolls.**  
One pint of bread flour, two heaping teaspoonfuls baking powder, two of sugar,

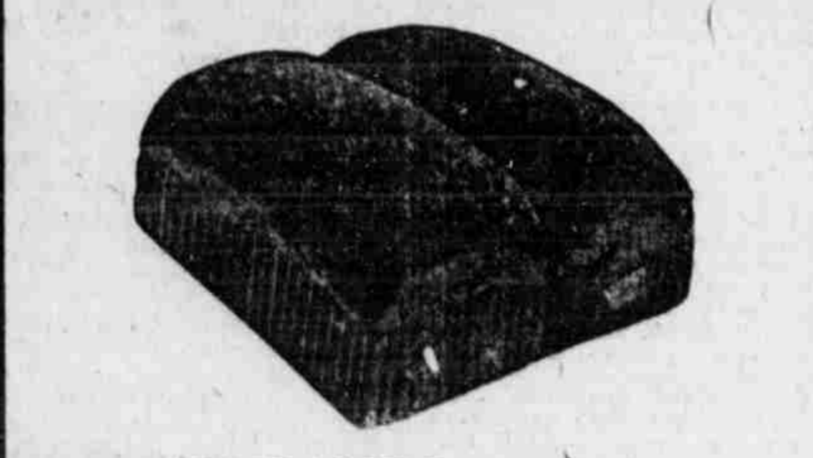
