

Resolved, That the Nebraska Woman's

Resolved, That the Nebraska Woman's Suffrage association in its official acts and relations remain in the present as in the past, strictly nonpartisan.

Whereas, We are appalled at the horror and enormity of the white slave traffic, through which, according to recent authority, 30,000 women are victims of greed and lust,

which shall deal effectively with this evil study of good government to its members in preparation for future citizenship, and we promise to co-operate with this movement in so far as we are able.

Resolved, That we go on record as fa-voring the mothers' pension and work-man's compensation acts, and that we also approve of the distribution of convict labor profits among their families. Resolved. That we also memorialize congress to add to our national constitution article 16, to read as follows: "The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied on account of sax."
