Plan to Get Students Here with the Cornhuskers Stirs Comments.

Bresnahan's Claim to Be Arbitrated by the Commission

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—Arbitration of the claim for alleged breach of contract by Roger Bresnahan against the St. Louis National League baseball club probably will be placed in the hands of the National Commission instead of the Missouri courts. This was the agreement of counsel for both sides, reached this afternoon prior to a meeting of the league directors. A general decision to arbitrate the matter was agreed upon yesterday.

Club owners of the American league, who arrived here today to attend the annual meeting of the organization tomorrow, discussed with interest the report that Fielder Jones, former manager of the Chicago team, is slated to become manager of the New York team.

Flynn and McCarty Are Sure of Victory; Odds Change Often

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 10.—Until the going taps at 10 o'clock tonight for their twenty-fourth fight, the flaccid situation as between Luther McCarty, of Missouri "white hope," and Jim Flynn of Pueblo will remain as puzzling to forecasters at the late California political situation.

Up to and beyond the final hours today, first McCarty then Flynn slid into the position of favorite. Wagers changed their mind often and the odds were unsteady late in the day.

Flynn said today he expected to enter the ring weighing about 130 pounds. McCarty tips the scales at about 200 pounds. McCarty has five and one-half inches more reach, three and one-half inches more altitude and a wallop confessedly more powerful than Flynn's. Flynn, nevertheless, expects to maintain his reputation by destroying still another "white hope." Neither man expects the fight to go the limit.

GIANT BASE BALL CLUB PART OF TRUST ESTATE

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 10.—The will of John T. Brush, late owner of the New York National League baseball club, disposing of an estate estimated at \$3,000,000, was filed for probate today.

Aside from personal property bequeathed to members of the family, the greater part of the Brush holdings, including the ball club, is made a trust estate and given into the care of Harry N. Hempstead of Indianapolis, a son-in-law, and Ashley Lloyd of Cincinnati. The will provides that these two as trustees of the estate may retain the holdings as long as profitable or they may dispose of them at any time.
