PROTEST ON CANAL BILL READ

Formal Note Written by Sir Edward Grey Presented to Knox.

ELABORATE ARGUMENTS MADE

Asserts the Exemption of American Coastwise Vessels is Unfair—Asserts It Would Break the Treaty.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Great Britain's formal note of protest against that section of the Panama canal act which exempts American coastwise shipping from payment of tolls for passing through the Panama canal, a document written by Sir Edward Grey, British minister for foreign affairs, was presented to the secretary of state, Philander C. Knox, tonight by the British ambassador, James Bryce, who read the note, word for word, to the secretary at the latter's home. It is an elaboration of the points of objection in the note presented to the State department last July.

In brief, these objections are: That while it was clearly in violation of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty either to permit or refund tolls on all American shipping using the canal, the same objection probably would apply to the coastwise shipping in view of the probable impossibility of framing regulations that would not result in a preference to American shipping.

the feeling that the canal should be open to British and United States vessels on terms of equal treatment. . . . If the files set out in the Hay-Pauncefote treaty secure to Great Britain no more than most-favored-nation treatment, the value of the consideration given for surrendering the Clayton-Bulwer treaty is not apparent to his majesty's government. . . .

The argument advanced in the United States senate that the words "all nations" cannot include the United States, which would otherwise be prevented from using its own territory for re-ventilating its warships or landing troops, is briefly dismissed by the statement that it is completely overturned by a reading of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty in connection with the 1850 canal convention. . . .

Grey continues: "Now that the United States has become the practical sovereign of the canal, it is in a position to exercise belligerent rights for its protection."

The next point made is that the exemption of American coastwise shipping from tolls would violate the undertaking that the tolls should "be just and equitable." . . .

He also indicates in his note that underlying the objection to the exemption from toll of American coastwise ships is an apprehension that in the future the principle might be extended to cover American ships in the foreign trade.

Otherwise the note is devoted almost entirely to an effort to demonstrate that any such exemption of American shipping as is proposed is in direct conflict with the terms of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty and that President Taft was clearly wrong when he took the contrary view. . . .

Secretary Knox listened attentively to the reading of the note and promised to take the matter under careful consideration, which he felt would require some time. It has been strongly intimated in official circles, however, that it was the president's intention to settle this important question before closing his administration, either by recommending that the senate agree to submit it to arbitration, or preferably by the more direct means of an agreement between the two nations referred to in today's British note.

The ambassador was accompanied by Mr. Innes, the counsellor and first secretary of the embassy and in reading the entire British note to the secretary, followed precisely the instructions of Sir Edward Grey, the writer of the note.

What Neutralization Means.

The word "neutralization" in the preamble of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty is not confined to belligerent operation but refers to the system of equal rights for which article VIII provides. Joint protection and equal treatment are the only matters alluded to, to which that neutralization must refer.

"It certainly was not the intention of the United States government," says Grey, "that any responsibility for the protection of the canal should attach to them in the future. Neutralization, therefore, must refer to the system of equal rights."

The note then declares that the situation created by the substitution of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty for the Clayton-Bulwer treaty was identical with that resulting from the boundary waters treaty of 1909 between Great Britain and the United States, which, in brief, provided that the boundary waters should be free and open to commerce, "applying equally and without discrimination to the inhabitants of ships, vessels and boats of both countries."

Such rules and regulations, all "charged" shall apply alike to the subjects of either of the high contracting parties and they shall be placed on terms of equality in the use thereof."

It is also asserted that a similar, though more restricted provision, appeared in the treaty of Washington and it is recalled "how strenuously" the United States protested, as a violation of equal rights against the system which Canada had introduced of a rebate of a large portion of the tolls of certain freights on the Welland canal and how in the face of that protest the system was abandoned.

Case of Suez Canal. Referring to the third article of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty, the note points out that the Suez canal rules, which the treaty adopts for the Panama canal, is that the waterway shall be free and open to the vessels of the commerce and war of all nations observing the rules on terms of entire equality, so that there shall be no discrimination against any such nation. It is said that the present-day statement of the case is wholly at variance with the real provisions which he treats the words "all nations" as excluding the United States because it had constructed the canal on its own territory and thereby acquired an absolute right of ownership. . . .

"They cite the British government's consideration," says Sir Edward, "that by the Clayton-Bulwer treaty the United States had surrendered the right to construct the canal and that by the Hay-Pauncefote treaty they recognized that right as

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Biggest Gun Made For U. S. Explodes; None Sustains Injury

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—A gun of British make and of fifty tons weight, the largest and heaviest ever built by the United States government, at a cost of \$100,000, exploded at the Sandy Hook proving grounds today. While the explosion of similar guns has taken scores of lives the big test gun blew to pieces without causing so much as a scratch to the men around it.

The twenty-ton gun, which was blown a quarter of a mile, the muzzle was buried six feet under the ground, but the explosion did not injure any of the men standing on the temporary dismounting carriage, which was not struck, although the structure itself was wrecked.

Speculation as to the cause of the accident brought out the belief that perhaps the sudden drop in the temperature had some effect on the gun. Officially, however, Lieutenant Colonel Hatcher, who commanded the firing, declined to say the cause of the explosion had not been determined.

Commission Will Rule Evangelists

CHICAGO, Dec. 10.—An international commission to supervise evangelistic and religious revivals was voted by the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America here today in the closing session of its second quadrennial meeting. The novel idea of a commission of all religions to regulate revivals and revival methods did not go through without opposition.

"I cannot conceive of any commission controlling the tempo of the average evangelist," said the Rev. Edwin Haydel, D. D., of Philadelphia.

Each of the thirty-two denominations represented in the federal council will have a member on the commission. Financing, advertising and equipment of evangelistic campaigns will be controlled by the commission.

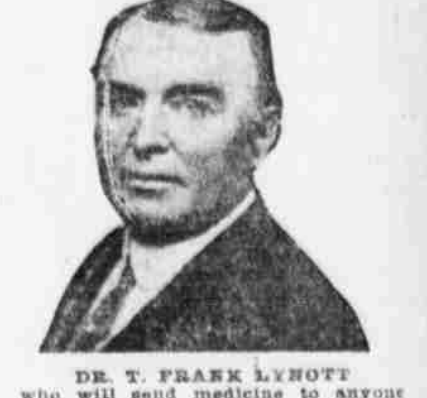
