DRAW COLD STORAGE BILL

Food Commissioner Will Have it Presented to Legislature.

IN LINE WITH NATIONAL MOVE

Measure Intended to Keep Products in Refrigeration Only One Year and Provides Penalty for Sale.

LINCOLN, Dec. 20.—(Special).—Pure Food Commissioner Nels P. Hansen has prepared a bill to be introduced in the next legislature...

The bill is one which has been adopted by the national commission and will be introduced in every legislature in session this winter in the different states.

It provides that any individual or corporation desiring to operate a public cold storage or refrigerator warehouse shall make application to the pure food department for permission, and, after an examination as to the sanitary conditions, the application may be granted upon the payment of a license fee...

WHEN ARE SOLONS 'RAISED'?

Question Whether Lawmakers of This Year Get Increase.

ALDRICH AND MARTIN DISAGREE

Former Holds New Amendment to Constitution Will Not Affect Salaries Until Two Years Hence.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Dec. 20.—(Special).—Can the members of the legislature draw pay under the amendment adopted at the last election, which provides a salary of \$600 for the term, is a proposition for consideration at the present time.

Section 4, chapter 224 of the 1911 statutes, relating to the increased pay under the change in the constitution, reads: "At the first election of members of the legislature held after the adoption of this amendment, members of the senate and house of representatives shall be elected for two years. Both senators and representatives shall receive pay at the rate of \$600 for the term."

When the attention of Governor Aldrich was called to the section by a Bee representative this morning, he said: "It is clearly shown by that section that the members of the coming session cannot draw pay under the new constitutional amendment, but will have to be contented with the old pay. I had not noticed it before, but it is plain on the face of it that it is the members who are elected after the adoption of the amendment who come under the provisions of this act, and as the members of the 1913 legislature were elected before the amendment was adopted, I cannot see how they can draw the \$10 per day."

Martin Holds for Raise. Attorney General Martin, who discovered the clause, said at first that he was at a loss to know what to say, but later in the day he announced that he should hold that as the closing paragraph of the section, which relates to the proclamation of the governor, says that "after the proclamation of the governor that the constitutional amendment has received a constitutional majority and is in force"

it is plain that the members are entitled to their increase under the new law. However, he admitted that there was a chance for argument, but believed the supreme court would construe the section liberally as meaning that it referred to the 1913 session.

After the attorney general had issued the above statement Governor Aldrich said that he should hold to his previous statement that the section which reads that members elected "after" the adoption of the amendment were the ones who would come under the provisions of the act and not those who were elected at the time the amendment was voted on. "After means after, doesn't it?" said the governor, with a shake of his head; "and I don't see how you can get around the proposition. The closing words of the section are the same words used in all matters of this kind and cannot by any means affect the body of the act."

The attorney general may be right in his contention that the closing clause remedies the opening of the statute, but it is the almost unanimous opinion of other state officers that the little word "after" will look mighty big to the fellow who wants the \$10 a day.

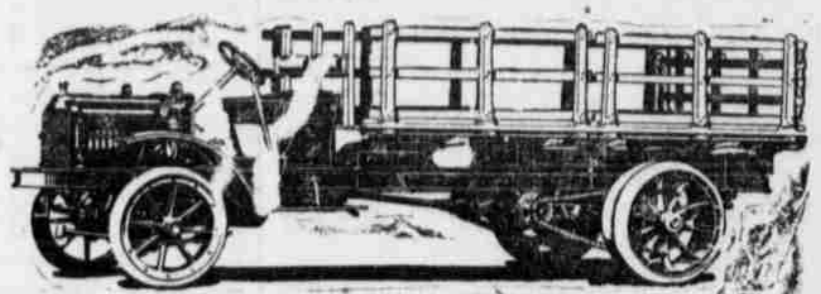
