#### DRAW COLD STORAGE BILL

Food Commissioner Will Have Presented to Legislature.

#### IN LINE WITH NATIONAL MOVE

Measure Intended to Keep Products in Refrigeration Only One Year and Provides Publicity for Sale.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Dec. 20 .- (Special.) -- Pure Food Commissioner Nels P. Hansen has prepared a bill to be introduced in the next legislature relative to cold storage and refrigerator warehouses and the dis-

The bill is one which has been adopted by the national commission and will be introduced in every legislature in session this winter in the different states.

position of the food kept therein.

It provides that any individual or corporation desiring to operate a public cold storage or refrigerator warehouse shall make application to the pure food department for permission, and, after an examination as to the sanitary conditions, the application may be granted upon the payment of a license fee. No article of food intended for storage shall be placed therein unless it is in perfect condition, and it shall be marked with the date of storage and shall not be kept in storage more than twelve months, except with the consent of the commission. It will also be unlawful for any person to place on sale any uncooked article which has been kept in cold storage without notifying customers by the display of a sign marked "Cold Storage Goods Sold Here." It will also be unlawful to return to cold storage any article of food which has once been released from cold storage and placed on sale, but will not refer to the changing from one cold storage to another if it is not done to evade the law.

'It is the intention of the act," said Commissioner Hansen, "to prevent the holding of eggs and other such food for a long time in order to force up the price on the same, and give people who want fresh goods a chance to know just what they are getting." New Pierce Bank.


