BOAT'S PASSENGERS LANDED

Fifty-Seven Men and Women Taken Off Steamer Turrialba.

PASSENGERS GREATLY ALARMED

Many Prepared to Battle Waves When First Steamer Struck and Expected Death by Drowning.

NEW YORK, Dec. 26.—The fifty-seven passengers and eighteen of the crew of the United Fruit company's steamship Turrialba, among whom yesterday morning at Brigantine shoals, nine miles north of Atlantic City, N. J., arrived here last night on board the United States revenue cutter Seneca.

The cutter had stood by the stranded vessel all last night, and at 3 o'clock this morning passengers, part of the crew and the baggage and mail were safely transferred and the steamer started on its Christmas journey to this port.

The Seneca arrived at quarantine shortly after dark and was boarded there by United States customs officers.
