To Recommend Bill. "This year there will be a legislative committee." said Mr. Palmer, "and it will commend a bill to do away with the skullduggery in the cement business There are a lot of fellows that enter the cement block business as a get rich quiet game.' They manufacture an inferior grade of cement block, sell as many as they can before they are found out, and then get out of the business. It hur's the whole cement business of the state to have a few like that operating, because the people come to think that all the cement business is like that.

Regulate Manufacture. "We can have a bill that will regulate the manufacture of cement blocks, requiring the ingredients to be mixed in given proportions and making other simple requirements that will bring all the cement blocks up to a certain standard. That is the only thing we want in the way of a legislative recommendation and we will have a legislative committee for
