More Than Thousand People Sought to Have Him Start Blaues for Them Since He Entered the Business.

NEW YORK, Jan. 20 -Additions to the striking narratives of the extent to which arson profit is practiced in this city, furnished by "Izzy the Painter," convict firebug informer, were made by him today to the district attorney, whose office spent a busy Sunday in preparation for the examinations in the "arson trust" investigation by the grand jury tomorrow.

"Isny." who is more formally known as Isador Stein, continues to tell of fires that he made throughout the city, giving facts and circumstances with the greatest detail and accuracy, says a statement from Assistant District Attorney Weller tonight Particular About Location.

Stein, who, according to the authorities. has confessed to setting more than tifty fires, told the district attorney that the vicinity of a fire engine house was preferred as the location for a fire. Mr. Weller's statement said, as when no alarm was turned in it took longer for information about the fire to get to the fire marshal's office, giving time for the odor of gasoline or benzine used by the firebug to disappear.

"Stein says that more than 1,000 people have asked him to make fires for them since he came to this city in 1967," the statement adds.

Stein says that while standing on the street corner two or three people each day would ask him to make a tire for them. In one case a man told Stein that he wanted to have a fire, but that he could not have it until the following week, because he wanted to move out his new plane. Accordingly the plane was moved out and Stein went ahead."

Revelations in Chicage. CHICAGO, Jan. 19 .- Revelations made oday in an all-day investigation of the 'arson trust' by the state's attorney involved at least five persons in a fire fraud scheme which prompted several big fires in Chicago and other cities. A number of witnesses were examined and their testimony will be presented to the grand jury. Included in the list of suspected men is Benjamin Fink, alias Finkelstein. alias Franklin, now in custody under suspicion of being one of the leaders of a nation-wide gang of incendiaries.
