Cellmate of Diggs Nolen is Held to the Federal Jury. Alfred Gallahue, who was a cellmate of Diggs Nolen in the county jail and who is alleged to have aided Nolen in his attempt to escape from that institution, was bound over to the federal grand jury under bonds of \$1,500 by United States Commissioner Daniel. Gallahue was charged with conspiracy to rescue or set at liberty a federal prisoner. Harry Seaman, another prisoner in the county jail, was the only witness. He told of the plan worked out in his presence, whereby Gallahue, upon his release from jail, was to tie a package of saws and other articles on a string which would be dropped from a window in the top floor of the jail by a trusty. Seaman said he did not see Gallahue tie the package on the string after he was discharged from the jail, but he did see the package after Nolen had secured it. George Reddy, who was charged with conspiracy also, was discharged, there being no evidence showing that he was in any way connected with the deal.

APPAIRS AT SOUTH OMAHA

New Administration Charter Bill to Be Introduced. IS AIMED AT ANNEXATION

Backers Give Out that Lee Bill Will Not Be Recognized When Present Legislature Gets Through with it.

After a session behind doors closed and locked in the office of the city clerk the council yesterday evening let the cat out of the bag and only admitted that there would be presented to the legislature another annexation bill besides the one to be introduced by state Representative Michael Lee. The administration annexation bill, it is understood, is the work of Hootor's charter committee, although the authenticity of it is not acknowledged by anyone as yet. It was prepared without publicity and it is thought for a very good reason.

It appears that the Lee bill had been hailed with a great deal of pleasure by the majority of the citizens. Its fairness was admitted on every hand, but it does not please the officials who are against annexation absolutely, whatever pretenses they may put up to lull the people to sleep.

The annexation bill prepared by the administration for introduction makes the submission of the annexation question more difficult in that it makes it necessary to submit a petition signed by 25 per cent of the registered voters instead of 10 per cent as at present. A like provision practically nullified the recall section of the charter. The rest of the administration bill takes care of the fire and police departments, schools, library, etc.

It is being urged upon the citizens who are not conversant with the facts that the Lee bill does not take care of the schools, while those conversant with the law know that the school bill must be prepared and has been prepared as a separate measure in order to meet the needs of the school department which is a separate corporation from the city government.

The great joker in the administration bill is that if it fails to pass, then the question of annexation cannot be submitted to the people for five years. That has been the point of attack all along the line.

It is thought that the joker contained in the administration annexation bill will do the work. Another provision of the administration bill requires that in case annexation carries a committee of five citizens from South Omaha and as many from Omaha shall then get together and arrange for the merger of the two cities. It is provided that no one who has not lived for ten years in South Omaha may serve on the committee. Whether this committee was to be appointed or elected could not be found out, because of the jealous care with which the instrument was guarded.

At any rate it was generally circulated last night that John B. Watkins, chairman of the Hootor committee was to leave last night or this morning for the legislature who was to go with the annexation bills prepared by Representative Michael Lee.

Second Committee Active. Hootor's charter committee is not to have the game all its own way, if the committee appointed at the citizens' meeting last Thursday has anything to say about the matter, and the members think they will have something to say. The committee is composed of Dean Ringer, A. H. Murdoch and Samuel L. Winters. It was the purpose of the meeting that appointed the three men to amend the charter from a standpoint of the common citizen as opposed to that of the officeholders and corporations.

A meeting of the committee is called for next Wednesday night at the office of H. H. Murdoch. In the meantime John B. Watkins of Hootor's charter committee will go to Lincoln to look after the affairs that affect South Omaha.

John M. Tanner, another of the Hootor committee, has given it out that he will not know his own bill when "we get through taking on amendments."
