Special Officer Ford Starts Out to Clean Up the City

Street Commissioner Kugel has instructed Police Officer Ford, who has been detailed to enforce street cleaning ordinances, to call on and warn theatrical managers that henceforth they will not be permitted to post unsightly bills on every billboard in the city.

"I saw a man posting up an advertisement of a show at one of the theaters," said Kugel, "and warned him to desist. He said he was working for his bread and butter and I had to see his manager. I discovered that the bills advertisement shows are not posted by the bill-posting companies, but by men sent out by the theatrical managers."

Kugel is making an effort to enforce the ordinance prohibiting the littering of streets by the contractors who are erecting buildings. Officer Ford has been instructed to arrest violators of the ordinance, as well as to "pinch" drivers of coal wagons who persist in loading their vans with screened coal until it runs over into the street.

Kugel may ask the city council to pass an ordinance requiring builders to put up a cash deposit to insure the cleanliness of the premises where they work. Any litter in the street would be removed and the expense paid out of this cash deposit.

Further, the street commissioner is considering the advisability of an ordinance compelling downtown merchants to keep their refuse in tight boxes or cans so that the gutter snipes who come along looking for stuff in ash heaps or refuse piles will not scatter the material all over the alley.

Serious Charges Against Four Men

Warrants are out for the arrest of four men from Fort Crook, charging three with bootlegging and one with offering a bribe to the county attorney of Stary county.

County Attorney James P. Bagley charges that James McMartin offered him \$100 a month if he was not interfered with in selling liquor at Fort Crook. Officers for whom warrants are out are J. W. Lowry, William Brennan, a druggist, and a Mr. Keller, who works for Brennan.

PARCEL POST MAPS VARY

Those Sold by Map Companies Are Different from the Official.

CHANGES THE RATE TO LINCOLN

Omaha is at the Limit of One Zone. Giving Patrons of Eastern Nebraska the Benefit of the Rate.

Omaha firms that are using parcel post maps purchased from some of the map companies will have to discard them and secure the regulation government map, if they are to avoid complications in determining the amount of postage that is required between Omaha and Lincoln and other points that are not far from the border line.

Some of the map companies have put out a map that places Lincoln in the first zone as reckoned from Omaha, while the official map published by the government, to be used in the regulation of the parcel post business, places Lincoln in the second zone.

E. C. Wilbur, in charge of transportation for the M. E. Smith company, made a trip to the postoffice building to register a complaint because the company had been required to pay second zone postage on parcels sent to Lincoln. He called the attention of the department of the railway mail service to the matter and was told the matter of mailing was out of that department's line. A map bought from one of the map publishing companies was the only kind found in the office of the assistant superintendent of the railway mail service, so Wilbur's notion was more than ever strengthened as this map showed Lincoln in the first zone. He was told to take the matter up with the postmaster.

A close examination and comparison of the two maps will show that a hair almost divides the issue. For the purpose of determining rates the government has divided the United States into units of area 30 minutes square, identical with a square of the area formed by the intersecting parallels of latitude and meridians of longitude.

In determining zones the government does not take a given city as the center around which to draw the circular boundaries of the zone, but rather takes the center of the unit area in which a given city is found. Now it happens that a line dividing two of these units of area passes through Omaha, north and south. This causes the trouble. The map companies have chosen to reckon Omaha in the western unit of these two, while the government map makers have chosen to reckon Omaha in the eastern unit area of these two. This throws the center of the first zone past Omaha twenty-five or thirty miles farther east than is shown by the map companies and therefore leaves Lincoln across the border in the second zone.

Barber Irate Over Order to Use Clean Towel for Each Man

Considerable excitement prevailed at the city hall when an athletic health inspector came in to report that a barber had threatened to sue the city with him if he ever again came into his shop and told him how to keep it clean.

Following the inspector came the barber. He tackled Dan Butler and told that commissioner that any man who presumed to tell him how many towels he should use on a customer was in danger of immediate annihilation.

"Beiter be careful, that man is a health officer and working under orders," advised the commissioner.

"How was I to know it?" retorted the red-headed barber.

Now city commissioners think it may be necessary to put all health officers in uniform so that they will command greater respect. Acting under Health Commissioner Connell's orders inspectors have visited barber shops and bath houses and directed the proprietors to clean up.

When the inspectors have been able to convince these proprietors that they are really municipal officers and not meddlers, their advice has been heard with consideration, but the inspectors declare they are unable to convince some of the men with authority.

Gold Money for Best Essays on Omaha

Prizes amounting to \$300 in gold will be distributed among school children of Omaha, South Omaha, Benson, Dundee and Florence by the Omaha Ad club when the essay on the Omaha contest closes Omaha day, May 23.

Eight first prizes and as many second prizes have been decided upon by A. S. Burleigh of the Ad club, A. C. Kennedy and E. F. Levinson of the Know Omaha committee, who compose the special committee. These may be divided into third, fourth and fifth prizes.

The competition will be confined to grades and the children of each grade will compete with each other. It is arranged so that all students in Omaha institutions of learning will have a chance at one of the prizes. The plan has been presented to E. C. Gray, superintendent of schools, and Dr. E. Holmquist, president of the Board of Education, and endorsed by them.

The essays must be submitted to the teachers of the respective grades not later than May 9 so that a special committee will have time to select the prize winners before the awards are made on May 23.

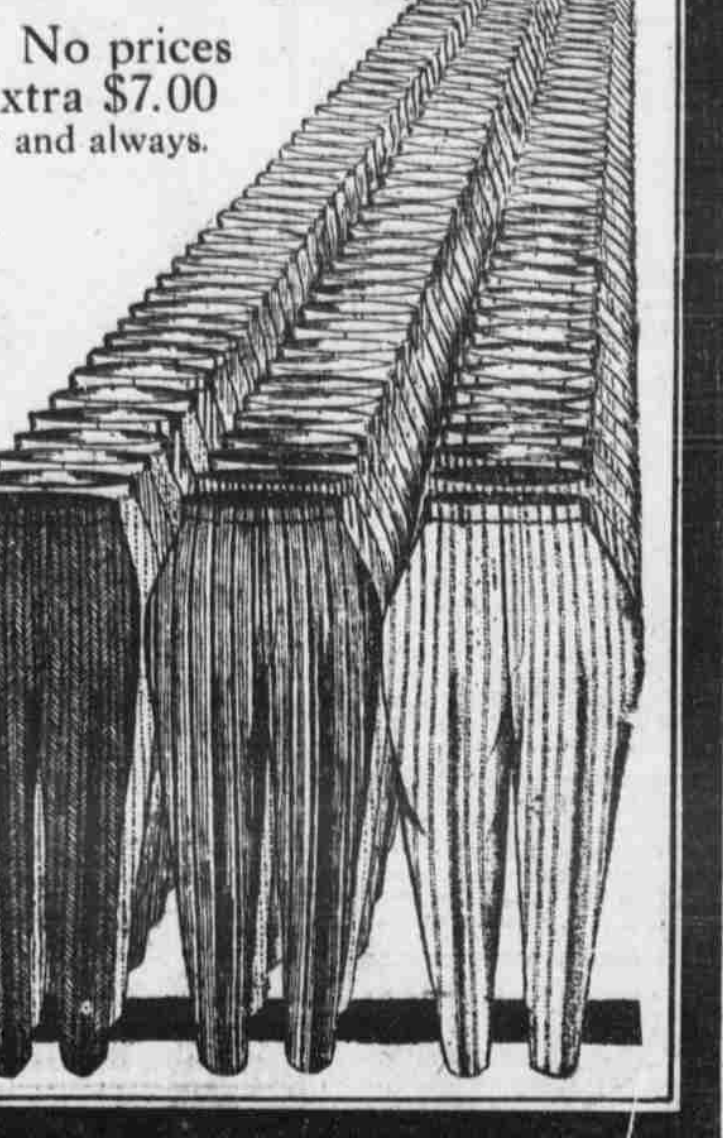

FLOUR BLEACHING UPHELD

Nebraska Millers Pleased that Court Coincides with Their View.

WILL WAIT FOR AN APPEAL

N. B. Uppike Says He Will Not Resume Bleaching Until Case Has Been Carried Up by the Government.

It was with much satisfaction that N. B. Uppike, president of the Uppike Milling and Grain company, read in The Bee that at St. Louis the United States court of appeals had reversed the decision of the United States district court in what has been known as the bleached flour cases. This decision gave Mr. Uppike the greatest satisfaction on account of the fact that the higher courts have taken the position for which he has always contended—that the bleaching of flour takes nothing from it, nor does it adulterate it in any manner.

Owing to the fact that the government may carry the case to the United States supreme court, Mr. Uppike is of the opinion that Nebraska millers will not resume the bleaching process, at least until it is known just what is to be done in the matter of appealing.

The bleaching process, so far as it applies to flour is simple, consisting merely of passing the flour through a box, the air inside of which has been heated to a high degree, but not sufficient to burn or remove any of the nutritious or healthy properties. No substances or ingredients of any kind are added and nothing is taken away. Coming out of the bleacher the flour is pure itself, according to the miller, and in this condition goes into the sacks without any additional handling. No change in any of the component parts of the flour has been made aside from making the product as white as snow.

Should the government drop the case now, or should it carry it to the United States supreme court and then lose, it would be an easy matter for the mills of the country to resume bleaching, for anticipating a decision in line with the one rendered in St. Louis they have left their bleachers intact in their mills and all that would be necessary to start them in operation would be to slip the belts over the pulleys and turn on the current.

Flour Not Changed. The bleacher is nothing but an air-tight box from which the oxygen has been burned out. Through this vacuum the flour is dropped from the bolting machines and as it comes out it is pure, white, no chemicals or other treatment being applied.

Nebraska wheat still has the reputation of making the best flour in the world, even when unbleached and with bleaching re-established, Mr. Uppike is of the opinion that it will be considered all the better, if such a thing is possible of conception.

In milling the hard wheat of the north it has been found necessary to soften it by mixing with durum wheat or rye, but with the Nebraska wheat it is quite different. It is recognized everywhere that the wheat of this state is just hard enough to make high grade flour without adding any foreign grains or mixtures. This fact has been established both in this country and abroad. Without bleaching the flour is a bit dark, but if bleached it becomes snow white and is much sought after everywhere, being the favorite with both bread and pastry makers. Nebraska flour being of such a high

grade, whether bleached or unbleached, Mr. Uppike does not think Nebraska millers have won such a wonderful victory. However, he feels that the court has taken the logical view of the case and has upheld the reputation of Nebraska, fully and more completely establishing the true and real worth of its wheat.

"Toddy," a new wolf at Riverview park, howled himself hoarse Thursday because there are no cows at Riverview. This wolf was given to the city yesterday by D. McClure, a carpenter at Fort Omaha.
