There seems to be absolutely no opposition to this measure, for which John Burroughs, Ernest Thompson Seton, Gifford Pinchot, Dr. W. T. Hornaday, the Audubon societies and practically all of the country's most prominent lovers of wild life, have united in a persistent endeavor for immediate action. 
