WATER BOARD BILL IS

Measure to Place Supervision of the Omaha Plant Under Commission.

MEMBERS SIGN NAMES

Vates of Douglas Introduces Drastle Measure Governing Running of Autos and Providing for Competent Handling.

From a Staff Correspondent LINCOLN, Neb., Jan. 27 .- (Special Telegram.)-The bill to abolish the water board of Omaha and place the supervision of the water plant under the control of the city commission was introduced in the house this afternoon by six members of the Douglas delegation-Anderson, Flanagan, Hoff, Yates, Simor and Smith. The remainder of the delegation did not sign the bill. Druesedow expects to offer an amendment to the measure. The others offered no excuse for desiring to keep the present expensive water board drawing pay.

Yates introduced a bill to increase the salaries of the chief deputy sheriff and bookkeeper of Douglas county \$500 and the head failer and under deputy's 1300 a year each. Druesedow, Brain, Foster and Flanagan put in a bill to prohibit the sale of cold storage stuff which had been held for more than ninety days. Tee got in his measure to do away with the voting machines in Omaha and another to do away with the party circles In elections.

To Regulate Auto Speed Yates, of Douglas, and Baker, of Thomas, would put a crimp in the running of automobiles carelessly. Their machine shall be responsible for damages it does and if bought on time, the seller shall be responsible according to the equity he has in the machine.

It is also provided the machine may be taken by process of law in payment of damages to the extent of its value. Yates of Douglas would amend the pure food law to provide that the name of the manufacturer be placed on the pack-
