The price of flour was openly marked down at Chicago yesterday, and the trade in general, including millers, believe that they will be forced to accept slid lower prices in ocder to move the surplus which is now accumulating in Chicago, as well as in the east. Millers were not in the cash market yesterday, save in a small way, their purchases amounting to 20.000 bushels, which were divided up into several lots. The fact that Omaha was a seller of cash wheat to go to St. Louis reflected a lack of export business via the kulf ports. Kansas City reported a log ict of wheat carried over there yesterday and stocks increasing rapidly cash wheat, unchanged to be higher.
