OMAHA FORTS MAY PROFIT

Two Omaha Banks Made Depositories of Government Through New Order—Cash for Buildings in Nebraska.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—(Special Telegram.)—Ed-Congressman John L. Kennedy and Victor Rosewater, editor of The Bee, arrived in Washington this morning.

The accounts of all the banks are cut down to \$100,000 each, with the exception of the Omaha National, which is cut from \$400,000 to \$200,000, while the two new depositories start in with \$25,000 each.

HONORING CENTURY OF PEACE

DEFINES AUTHORITY OF ATHLETIC COMMISSION

ALBANY, N. Y., Feb. 18.—The New York State Athletic commission has exclusive power to regulate boxing matches, including the adoption of rules to regulate the sale of tickets, according to an opinion today by Attorney General Carmody.

The commission questioned the attorney general concerning his jurisdiction to entertain a complaint against the Empire Athletic club of New York in a proceeding to revoke the club's license upon the ground that it sold tickets in excess of the seating capacity of its club house.

Attorney General Carmody says the legislature intended "to confer upon the state athletic commission plenary powers for the regulation of boxing matches."

IOWA CITY STILL TIED FOR LEAD IN LEAGUE RIFLE SERIES

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—Results of the sixth match in the league series of rifle shooting matches between high schools for the national championship show little change in the standing of the clubs.

In class A there is still a triple tie between Iowa City, Deering of Portland, Me., and Morris of New York City, each having six straight wins.

In class B the defeat of Portland High of Maine by Manual Training of Washington, D. C., gives the lead to Salt Lake City.
