Thinks County Could Realize Neat Sum by Selling Part of the Tract Off in City Lots for Rosts dence Purposes

Proposal to retain one-half of county's 180-acre hospital and poor farm tract and to hold the other half for onle in city lots will be made to the board of plasioners by Commissioner Lynch when the board meets, Mr. Lynch wants to use sixty scree for a poor house and farm and twenty acres for a hospital and grounds, holding the other eighty acres until the market takes an upward trend and then solling it in lots.

"Rather than sell the present ground to real estate men for them to exploit and make money out of and then buy other land for a county farm, I want to use the ground we have for the farm and let the county make something on the gale of what we don't need," said Mr Lonch, I think we should keep the eighty nores west of the tracks permanently for the county, take the south sixty acres for a poor house and farm and the north twenty for the hospital. We could build a poor chuse for \$40,000 and sixty acres uld be plenty for the poor house inmates to farm. This would be more economical than buying ground for a farm farther out. Then we could keep the hospital where it is. The crowded condition of the hospital would be relieved with the poor removed to the farm, Experience has proved it is unsatsfactory to have the hospital and poor house together. This would separate them. There could be a superintendent of the hospital and a superintendent of the who would see that the poor obeyed the rules. The poor should be kept at the farm and not allowed to go down town and beg and get drunk. Since stories have been printed about conditions at the hospital and poor house being so bad, lots of the inmates have come to town and to South Omaha and gone around begging.
