BIRTHS AND DEATHS IN OMAHA SHOW AN INCREASE

Total births in Omaha for February numbered 221, as against 206 for the same month of the previous year. There were born 127 white males, 91 white females, 3 colored males and 2 colored females. Three sets of twins—three boys and three girls—were born. The deaths for the month numbered 140, against 131 for the same month of 1912.
