### New Books

**ANNE BOLEYN.** By Reginald Frew. 363 Pp. Sherman, French & Co.

Of the hapless women whom ambition or considerations of state led to think their lives with that of the most uxorious of monarchs, Henry VIII, the story of Anne Boleyn is the most pathetic. It is pitiful because she for, so brief a time, enjoyed the confidence and love of the king, her husband; because of the cruelty of the aspirations that were cast upon her character; because of the fact that, although she desired to gratify her husband in the ambition which had led him to marry her, nature thwarted her, and, finally, because of the fact that the man who had promised to love and cherish her, not merely sent her to the block, but a few hours before the axe fell persuaded a plant archbishop to grant him a divorce and declare the marriage invalid from the very beginning.

This volume keeps closely to historic facts, and tells of the incidents of the court up to the time of the marriage of Henry and Anne. There is promise of a second volume by the authors, Rev. George Bray and Freeman Daughters, collaborators, under the name of "Reginald Frew." Mr. Bray made his home at Ponca for some little time.

**THE SHADOW.** By Arthur Strincker. 32 Pp. \$1.25. The Century Company.

The record of an absorbing passion of pursuit, a chase which took so relentless a grip upon the mind of the pursuer that he outlasted even the memory of the crime for which he tracked his quarry to the kill. With the tenacity of the bulldog and the unerring instinct of the bloodhound, the "shadow," Detective Blake, pursues a counterfeiter all over the world in a chase of wild daring and peril. It is an engrossing story, powerfully told.

**ANDREW THE GLAD.** By Maria Thompson Daviess. 267 Pp. \$1.30. Bobbs-Merrill Company.

Another entertaining romance of the south, a hearty, sympathetic, refreshing tale that possesses all of the charm of atmosphere for which the author is noted. To add zest to the book an amusing political situation has been introduced that is done with a light touch and affords an opportunity for some interesting comment. There is a "possum hunt" that is good and serves a subtle and original purpose.

**THE MAID OF MIDDLES HAVEN.** By Gabrielle E. Jackson. 299 Pp. \$1.20. McBride Nast & Co.

The charming tale of a sweet-natured, lovable girl who is the guest of a friend near the Naval Academy at Annapolis and who becomes a moving figure in its social life. She is wooed by two of the cadets, and the difficulty of her choice between them makes the story, which ends to the eminent satisfaction of the reader.

**WITH THE MERRY AUSTRIANS.** By Amy McLaughlin. 354 Pp. G. P. Putnam's Sons.

For the setting of this charming love story, Miss McLaughlin takes the reader to the Austrian Tyrol, but her touch is sure, her local color faithful, and her story fascinating. A delightful vein of humor runs sparkling through the volume and many a long chuckle is vouchsafed the reader.

**EVEREZZE.** By Sarah P. McLean Green. 310 Pp. \$1.20. D. Appleton & Co.

A clean story, full of wholesome sentiment. A good laugh in every chapter and plenty of keen philosophy and common sense. How Geraldine Kewey fought her imaginary lila and became a real woman; how the love affairs of four people upset the old established customs among the simple folk of the valley, and many other incidents are told.

**THE LAPSE OF ENOCH WENTWORTH.** By Isabel Gordon Curtis. 309 Pp. \$1.50. F. G. Brown & Co.

Two men, one a newspaper writer, the other an actor, both friends, play off a game of poker for one of the most original stakes ever conceived—the absolute future of the loser. The scene of the story is in New York, and shifts constantly from theaters to a quiet home, and here and there about the thronged streets.

**THE PEACE MOVEMENT OF AMERICA.** By Julius Moritzen. 411 Pp. G. P. Putnam's Sons.

A picturesque presentation of interday incidents—the signing of the treaties with Great Britain and France, the visits to this country of leading internationalists, the great awakening that has found expression in the organization of new peace societies and the linking of the existing societies into a more concrete whole.

A review of the century. All interested in the opening of the Panama canal, or the development of California and the countries around the Pacific or in civic purity and the prosperity of the United States will find this book of interest.

**THE SOLDIER BISHOP ELLISON CAPERS.** By Walter E. Capers. 357 Pp. \$2. The Neale Publishing Company.

To the many thousands to whom Bishop Capers' life was an inspiration, this biography, written by his son, will be most welcome. Bishop Capers was spoken of as the best loved man in South Carolina, and the knowledge that he deserved this crown of praise is the heritage of his church and his state.

**THE AMERICAN NEWSPAPER ANNUAL AND DIRECTORY.** 1,100 Pp. \$2. N. W. Ayer & Co.

The forty-fifth year of continuous publication brings us the 1913 edition of this comprehensive review of the newspaper and magazine field. To the publisher of this country and those having dealings with them, this work is most useful. The facts and figures pertaining to each of the 24,381 publications listed are presented in a condensed and get-at-able form.

**THROUGH SOUTH AMERICA.** By Harry W. Van Dyke. 425 Pp. \$2. Thomas Y. Crowell Company.

The volume is certainly a most satisfactory one, viewed from the point of the prospective traveler, the business man with an eye to South American trade, or the reader in search of full and complete information about this great and vastly interesting continent. After an opening section giving an outline of the stormy history of South America from its discovery by Europeans, each country is taken up in turn, and its scenery, cities, people, social life and industrial, economic and commercial aspects described. Special stress is laid on the trade relations between the two Americas, on which the Panama canal will have such an enormous effect.

**THE APOSTLES' CREED AND THE NEW TESTAMENT.** Translated from the German of Johannes Kuhn by Prof. George W. Gilmore. 114 Pp. 75 Cents. Funk & Wagnell Co.

An illuminating history and discussion of the Apostles' Creed, by a scholar whose studies have been largely directed thereto.

**CHRISTIANIZING THE SOCIAL ORDER.** By William J. Rie. 100 Pp. \$1.00. The Macmillan Company.

The author describes the present social awakening in the organizations of religion, and seeks to show that the christianizing of the social order is the aim with which Christianity set out. He suggests methods of advance, and the personal and social action by which our present conditions can be molded into a juster, and happier community life.

**SWORDS AND PLOUGHSHARES.** By Edwin A. Mead. 246 Pp. \$1.50. G. P. Putnam's Sons.

This book presents a vigorous array of truths that should go far toward silencing the strident arguments that are heard favoring war or at least proclaiming its necessity. The author's argument against the spread of militarism is supported, not only by a high ethical conception of the relation of man to man and of nation to nation, but by economic expediency and a common-sense view of the possibilities of development for a nation if emancipated from the debilitating fear of its neighbors and the drain on its resources for the maintenance of armies and navies in competition with the growth

of the military equipment of its rivals.

**PIKE COUNTY BALLADS.** By John Hay. \$1.50. Houghton Mifflin Company.

The author is best known as a diplomat, but the generation which is passing away deeply impressed when these poems were first published and "Jim Bludso" created. The book is illustrated by N. C. Wyeth, and his vigorous drawings give a lurid glimpse of an interesting trio.

**THE TRUE STORY OF A ROUNDHOUSE AND OTHER POEMS.** By John Massfield. 325 Pp. \$1.30. The Macmillan Company.

The longest poem in the book is entitled "Dauber." It tells of a boy on an English farm who has a passion for painting. To this end he leaves the farm, is captivated by his first sight of a ship and goes to sea as a painter that he may study the sea.

For the rest, the book contains a collection of shorter pieces so less interesting in their own way than the initial one.

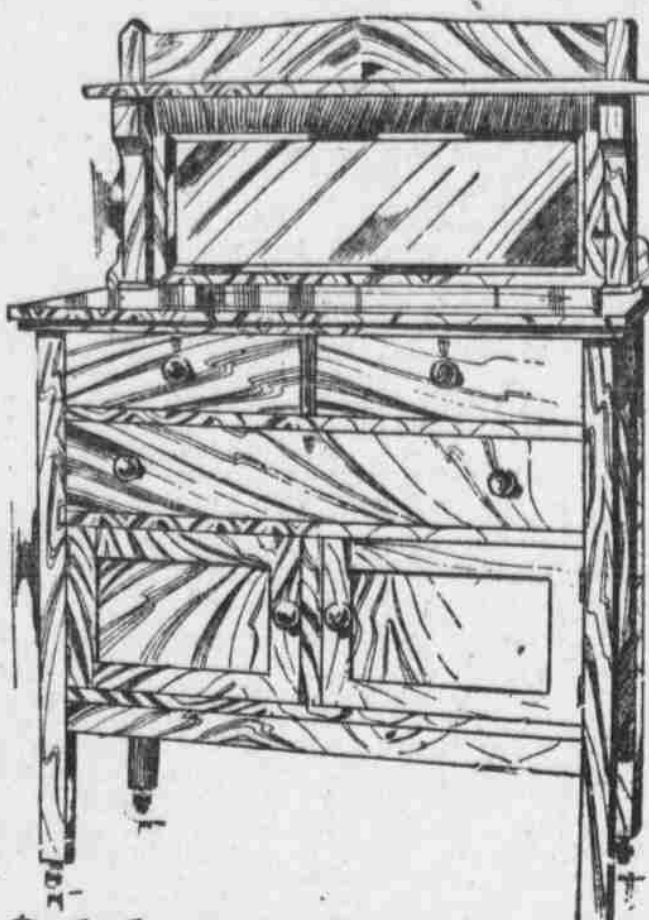
