CORN RESERVES STAGGERING Reports Show that There Are Vant Quantities of Corn Reing Held by the Farmers of the Country.

weather in the fall and early winter the growth of the wheat plant is smaller than usual in western Kansas and Nebraska and that some late sown fields haves not germinated, but that at the close of February abundant snow and moisture and snow protection was received in these sections, and the present feeling is that prospects are now bright. The heavy reserves of corn held on the farms of the United States, as reported by B. M. Snow, staggered the holders or longs, in the Chicago market and caused considerable selling even at lower prices. These reserves were reported by Mr. Snow at 1.352.009,000 bushels, which is 200,000,000 bushels larger than the reserves of 1911, the previous largest crop ever grown. Holdings of 567,900,000 bushels of eats on the farms of this country is the estimate of B. W. Snow, which is 40.1 per cent of the crop raised last year.
