Bulls Frighten the Bears Into Deating Cautiously with the Yellow Cereal on the Short Lines.

OMAHA, March 8, 1913. While the selling om May wheat was executed in rather a cautious manner yesterday and considerable of it was thrown into the pit through others than the regular brokers acting for the bull combination, the hand of longs was plainly visible. It is an easy matter to discover the workings of big people in wheat on the bull side, as any change made in their brokers may be traced through bull news, which is sent broad-cast as rapidly as it is collected. For some time past a certain concern in the trade has fathered a great deal of bull news received in Chicago, but during the last few days this has been changed and another big concern is now sending out most of the teiling items that are likely to favor the buils or longs. A report was received in Chicago from New York yesterday that vessel room was engaged at the gulf for twenty-one loads of wheat which is to be exported during this month.

terday that vessel room was engaged at the gulf for twenty-one loads of wheat which is to be exported during this month.

The best authorities in the trade advanced the opinion last night that the business was more than likely several weeks, and possibly several months old. The cash trade, here, generally speaking, was slow; only 10,000 bushels of hard wheat was worked for export via the gulf yesterday. There was a great deal of news of a bearish character thrown under the spoilight in speculative wheat circles yesterday. Stocks at Minneapolis and Duluth showed increases of 8,000 and 653,000 bushels, respectively, for the week, and in addition to this as a bearish factor, were the liberal receipts at Minneapolis and Duluth as well as at primary markets. The large holders of wheat in both Minneapolis and Duluth are anxious to place some of their grain, which is now being carried and they are willing to meet the views of buyers at Chicago. There were rumors of goodly amounts of cash wheat having been purchased in the northwestern markets yesterday. The first purchase of the 1913 crop of new wheat was made yesterday, being 10,000 bushels. This wheat is to be delivered in Chicago on or before July 25 at 30% con track. Cash wheat was unchanged to ½c higher.

Corn possessed a strong undercurrent yesterday, but the gain for the day was small. On any weak spots support was forthcoming from the Chicago bull crowd and this alone was enough to frighten the bears into acting with caution in the matter of putting out short lines. Cash corn was sold in a liberal way to industries and bids from the scaboard were below a working basis of export. There was a lack of liquidation by long holders, while, on the other hand, buying was mainly of a professional character. Cash corn was unchanged.


