BALL TEAM FOR CREIGHTON

Athletic Board Announces College Will Have Nine.

With the Exception of Pitchers All of the Other Positions Have Been Filled with Strong Players.

Contrary to all earlier rumors, Creighton university will have a varsity baseball team this spring. This announcement was made Saturday by the athletic board, and Arthur Dalley has been appointed as manager of the team. In February, when the students first began to talk baseball, it was said that there would be no base ball nine, because of the expense incurred. Base ball, according to the athletic board, has never been a paying proposition at Creighton, and for that reason, had no team last year. But the desire of the students for base ball this year, induced the board to decide in favor of a team, even in face of a deficit.

Arthur Dalley, the newly appointed manager, is an Omaha boy, and a student at the arts college. He has had much experience in managing base ball teams, having piloted several organizations through the summer season. He acted as manager of the Creighton High school foot ball during the last year. Already offers have been received from a number of colleges in surrounding states, and negotiations are now on for games with Nebraska State university.

Madden twirled for the art's team last year. There are said to be other pitchers in the professional departments, but as yet they have not been tried out. Gaffney, Pashe, Vandever and Murphy, are new men who are known to have had considerable experience. Of last year's arts department team, Miller, Coady, Dalley, Russum, Howard, Kane and McGuire are left. Kelly and McKee of the medical college will also be available. Although the professional students will be out of school earlier than the arts students, they will be in Omaha and will play with the team. Practice will begin at once on the varsity campus.

PETERSON LEADS IN SINGLES

Ohio Bowler Comes Within Twelve Points of Record.

Omahaans Close with Count of Twenty-Six Hundred and Twenty-Five in Early Squad of Five-Man Teams.

TOLEDO, March 9.—Another sensation in the thirteenth annual American Bowling congress tournament was created here yesterday when Frank Peterson of Columbus, rolling in the singles event, totaled 639, putting him in first place in the individual class by a large margin. Peterson's score is within twelve points of the American Bowling congress record of 705, held by Thomas Haley of Detroit.

More than twenty scores above 600 were rolled this evening in the individual events, but none of the men was able to get among the leaders.

In the late sets of the two-man events Nitschke and Tenny of Cleveland rolled 1,228 and took eighth place in the ten leaders of that event. Jetter's Gold Tops of Omaha, who rolled in the first squad of five-man teams tonight, closed with a count of 2,625. The commons rolled 881 in the first game, 825 in the second, and 899 in the third. Cochran was the strong man of the quintet. In his first game he totaled 192, which he increased to 201 in the second. He fell off to 178 in the third game. WESLEYAN MEN TAKE GAME

Defeat Nebraska Telephone Team by Score of 43 to 21.

Local Men Favorites in Play, but College Visitors Create Admiration by Excellence in Handling Ball.

The Nebraska Wesleyan basket ball five capped their eighth consecutive victory Saturday when they defeated the Nebraska Telephone company five in one of the swiftest exhibitions of basket ball seen on the local Young Men's Christian association floor, 43 to 21. The game from start to finish was fast, there being not one stage of the game that was slow or uninteresting to the rosters. By the closeness of the score during the first half the outcome of the game was in doubt until the visitors, by a display of team work and excellent goal throwing, gained a lead upon the locals that was too large to cut down in the second period.

The marked feature of the game was the wonderful team-work exhibited by the Wesleyanites, who displayed a system that has seldom been seen in Omaha basket ball circles. So perfect was it that the ball remained in the visitors' hands for several minutes at a time, which always ended up with a field goal to their credit.

The game started out with the first score going to the locals, and the telephone players were favorites with the crowd from then on, although their younger opponents obtained the best of the argument in the end. The score then saw-sawed back and forth from one side to the other, first with the visitors in the lead and again with the locals, until the beginning of the second period, when the locals gradually lost what team-work they exhibited in the first half and allowed the college players to gain a lead which was too large to overcome.

The locals played in hard luck and whenever they could get the ball any place near the goal, after a bit of fast team work, the chance of shooting a basket would, nine times out of ten, be broken up by the wonderful guarding of the Wesleyan guards, who were in every play at both ends of the floor, even following the ball so closely that they were enabled to shoot baskets, the work of the forwards. Whenever the telephone players did have a chance for a goal, in some hard-luck manner, the ball would roll out of the basket after having apparently been successful.
