Chicago Authorities Believe that When Men Are Gotten Back There Important Evidence Will Be Brought Out.

Ten minutes after their release on \$5,000 sonds, Jacob and Solomon Ross, who were arrested Tuesday night at 1818 North Twentieth street as fugitives from justice, were rearrested on a vagrancy and suspicious character charge. They are brothers and are thought to be members of a nation-wide areon trust, which has been the cause of many of the big fires over the country in the last few years. The men were arrested by the Omaha police at the instigation of the Chicago authorities, who have two detectives, J. F. Murphy and J. J. McGinnis, in Omaha at the present time, awaiting requisition papers for the two men, which are being drawn at Lincoln. The Ross brothers were owners of a clothoing store in Chicago, which on December 17 was destroyed by fire under very peculiar uircumstances. Upon investigation a man named Benjamin Fink was arrested and later confessed to having set fire to the

store for a certain sum of money. The brothers collected \$8,000 insurance, according to Detective Murphy, and later were arrested and released on bonds placed at \$50,000 apiece. They jumped the bonds coming to Omaha, where they were on the vagrancy charge. The men, who was all right."
