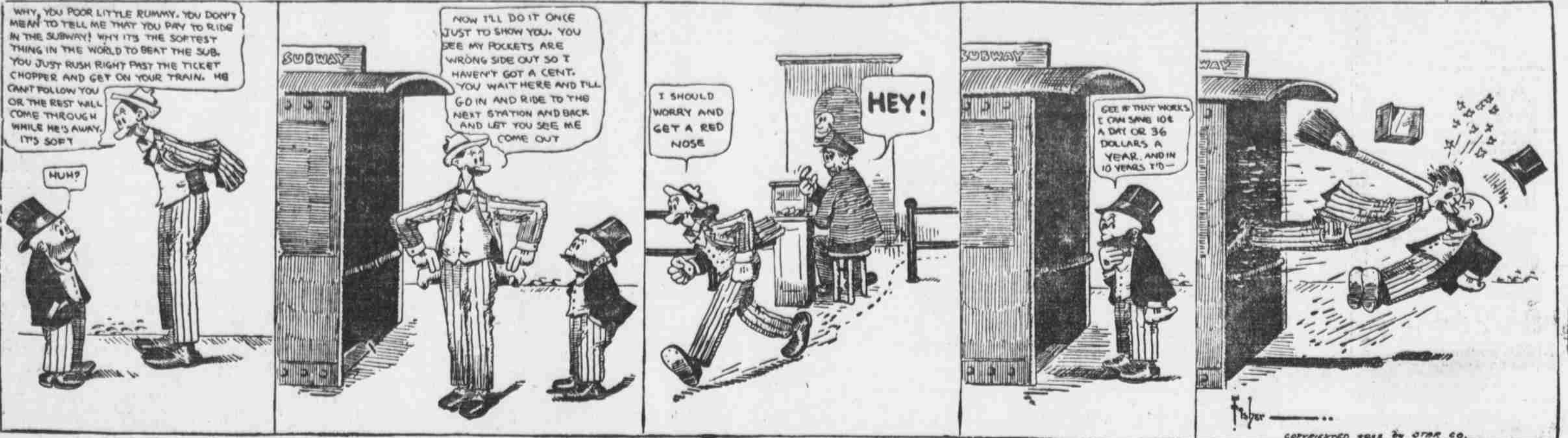

Tomorrow the senate finance committee will meet to go over the schedules as drafted by the ways and means committee.

Underwood to Report to Caucus. Chairman Underwood said tonight he planned to have his report on the bill ready for the caucus called by Representative Palmer of Pennsylvania.

The bill, it is estimated, will result in a loss in revenue of from \$30,000,000 to \$35,000,000, as compared with the Payne-Aldrich law.

The income tax provision, from which the loss of tariff revenue is expected to be recovered, has been thoroughly planned.

The alternative proposition ready to be placed into the income feature of the bill at the ways and means committee meeting on Monday, if it is found necessary to raise more revenue from the income tax to make up for any depletion in the tariff revenue that might result from whatever agreement is reached on sugar.
