WILSON WILL READ MESSAGE

President Decides to Present His Views in Person.

JOINT SESSION WILL BE HELD Senate and House Will Meet Tomor-

row at Noon to Hear Executive -Breaks Precedent of

a Century.

WASHINGTON, April 7 .- President Wilson's determination to read his own message to congress tomorrow has completely displaced the tariff and the income tax as subjects of chief popular interest. No president since John Adams has availed himself of the right. Congress was amazed when it heard of the president's plan. Some of the old line leaders refused to believe it until Secretary Tumulty personally brought the nows.
