"If the public or all of the big league players could see all the reports of cases of misconduct it would be seen the player usually is the offender. Nine-tenths of these cases involve the use of unprintable language by players. If there is excuse for such language the players are welcome to consult me by mail or personally. I believe that President Lynch of the National league will see the necessity of vesting umpires with supreme authority."
