September Wheat Given Big Spread in Chicago and Minneapolis.

WEATHER HELPS CORN OUTLOOK Favorable Conditions Overshadov Possible Chance of Late Planting and Risks that Go

Along with It.

OMAHA, April 14, 1913.

A big "apread" in September wheat is being placed between the Chicago and dilmeapolis markets. This fact came to light prominently Saturday, when there were heavy sales of that option in the Chicaso pit, while there were equally heavy purchases in the large northwest-

ern markets.

It has been usual for many years, in the event of favorable crop prospects in the southwest, for September wheat to receive considerable attention from the receive considerable attention from the bears in the northwest in the way of putting out short lines. There is a vast difference at the present in the May and September options at Minneapolis. Some conservative men in the trade view the "sprend" as risky, to say the least, and advance the opinion that those who have put out short lines of that month in Chicago are likely to suffer in the way of losses, as any further advance in the price at Minneapolis will cause great uneasiness and some covering of shorts at

easiness and some covering of shorts at Chicago.

The present weak condition of wheat may possibly be followed by a sensational change of some kind or another, which could be brought about by crop losses in Kansag or any of the other big yheat states. This is not expected by the trade at large, and especially by the holders of options and cash wheat in the Chicago market.

holders of options and cash wheat in the Chicago market.

At this season of the year the southwest generally is to be seen on the bull side of wheat at Chicago, but the larger speculators at this point are now astrided the speculative fence and are taking little or no interest in the wheat situation, with the possible exception of looking on and watching for an opening on which to make purchases.

It has been the custom for several weeks for the wheat speculators, not only at Chicago, but in other markets of the world to keep a close watch on the price changes at Liverpool.

Everyone knows that in order to hold the Liverpool market up around a certain and the control of the changes at Liverpool.

the Liverpool market up around a cer-tain level it is only necessary to use a little money and muscle, and the opin-ion has gained ground in Chicago that Liverpool is anything but legitimately strong. Cash wheat was ½c lower. Warmer and clearer weather is prom-ised by the weather authorities and this favorably will help the core situation favorably will help the corn situation from the standpoint of bears, while it will send the farmers into the fields, where they will seed their corn; it will also permit some marketing of both corn and oats at times. There is a lack of cash business in oats, as the Argentina surplus is pressing for sale and the government report on the live stock situation is viewed by the average speculator as a help to the bulls in oats. Cash oats were 1971c lower.
