National Agreement is Bar to Monopoly

NEW YORK, April 23.-"If a congressional investigation committee is appointed to look into organized base ball," declares W. H. Locke, the new presi-0 0 0 0 0 0 0 0 0 0 0 0 0 deriares to the Philadelphia National league. "the interesting fact will be made public that 50 per cent of the major league clubs and 75 per cent of the minor leagues lost money last season. This was due to the high salaries paid to the players and the heavy traveling expenses, coupled with the big money spent in rebuilding ball "The major leagues have contracted to

pay nearly \$1,000,000 in salaries this wea-Under the provisions of the national agreement the players must receive every dollar, no matter how much the clubs may lose. Each club stands on its own bottom. There is no syndicate ownership and neither the Nationa nor American league is incorporated. "As for the so-called reserve rule, pro-

fessional base ball would become chaotic without it. It prevents the clubs in the larger cities from enticing away valuable players from the smaller and weaker clubs. If the clubs should out-bid one another for stars every year it would not be long before New York and Chicago would control the best men in the market. I will venture to say that more than 90 per cent of the National league players are well satisfied with existing conditions today. I hope that congress will turn on the searchlight to show that the cry against organized base ball is unwarranted."
