

New York Spends Million a Year to See Boxing Bouts

NEW YORK, April 26 The public 1 spending nearly \$1,000,000 a year to se boxing contests in New York. According to a report of the state athletic commis sion published today the actual total of gate receipts at boxing contests for the year ending November 30, 1912, is \$882,926 out of which the state has received a

per cent commission of 540,351. Since the athletic commission was ap pointed in August, 1911, the grand total

of gate receipts has been \$1.219.199. Students of sporting statisties declar that the figures indicate that boxing i second only to have ba'l in popularity i New York state. At the end of the rea for which the report is issued there wer eighty-six boxing clubs operating unde the direction of the commission. Of the total of eighty-six licenses granted fortytine were to clubs operating in the metropolis. New York was the first state Topeka to organize a commission with jurisdiction over boxing, but several states are following the example.
