A decrease of 3,054,090 bushels in the amount of wheat on passage was noticed and statistics showed a decrease of 2,004,090 bushels in the visible supply. When values later gave away on selling by longs the rally which followed was helped by the statements that damage was being done by chinch bugs in Missouri, Kansas and Oklahoma. The market was quiet thereafter and the close was near the high point of the day.
