LIGHT LOSSES ON MOST ISSUES

Predictions of Large Cash Gain for Week Not Borne Out-Growing Confidence Reported by Mercantile Agencies.

NEW YORK, May 3.—Midsummer weather seemed to have brought about midsummer stock market conditions today. The volume of business was small and price movements were insignificant. The speculative movement was near the vanishing point and many traders took advantage of the occasion to remain away from the street. The drift of the stocks was downward, small fractional losses being sustained by most of them issues. Foreign markets moved in a hesitating way, apparently awaiting more definite news regarding the outcome of the problem raised by Montenegro's stitude. Some selling of Canadian Pacific by Berlin was reported and that stock was exceptionally heavy, both in this market and in London.
