## TEACHERS MEET SATURDAY

### History Instructors to Have Joint Session with Association.

### ENGLISH POLITICS IS THE TOPIC

Revolutionary Movements in Great Britain Will Be Reasoned Upon by Professor H. W. Caldwell.

The second annual meeting of the Nebraska History Teachers' association will be held in Omaha at the high school Saturday, May 10. The association will meet jointly with the sixth annual assembly of the Mississippi Valley Historical association and the Nebraska State Historical society.

The History Teachers' association has up until last year held its sessions at the time of the meeting of the Nebraska State Teachers' association. On account of the multiplicity of demands upon the time of the teachers during that meeting, the historical people decided to hold a separate convention. Mrs. Ada I. Atkinson of the Omaha high school is president of the organization.

The attendance last year in Omaha at the first meeting was something over forty. All teachers of history in Nebraska are eligible to membership in this organization, the purpose of which is to discuss methods and seek to improve the character of the history teaching work in the state.

### To Discuss English Politics.

One of the numbers of the program that is looked forward to with considerable interest is the discussion of the present day English revolutionary movements by Prof. Howard W. Caldwell of the University of Nebraska. Prof. Caldwell is looked upon as being especially well qualified to discuss this topic, as he recently returned from England, where he spent a year studying the English political situation.

He was granted a year's leave of absence with pay, and he chose to spend it in England. While there he visited the English Parliament constantly and secured a good grasp of the situation

centering around the Lloyd George program.

The complete program of the Saturday session of the association is as follows: A Course in Current History—Prof. E. L. Hendricks, Warrensburg, Mo. A Course in History for the Grades—Miss Mattie Allen, Lincoln (Neb.) High school. Movement Day—English Revolutionary Movements—Prof. Howard W. Caldwell, University of Nebraska. An Inspector's Observation of High School History Teaching—Prof. F. C. Ensign, State University of Iowa. Discussion—B. E. Asmuth, Council Bluffs High school; Miss Anne S. Grumman, Brownell Hall, Omaha.

## Mrs. A. B. Hunt Asks Divorce and Alimony

Alonso B. Hunt, superintendent of the Omaha Water works, 63 years of age, was sued for a divorce by his wife, Mrs. Lizzie M. Hunt, in district court yesterday morning.

Mrs. Hunt asks \$15,000 permanent alimony, saying that her husband has property worth more than \$30,000, and additional temporary assistance. They have one son, 23 years of age. A daughter died several years ago.

Mr. Hunt has been in the employ of the water works almost all the time since he has been in Omaha. He has been superintendent for about ten years. The couple's residence is in Florence. Mr. Hunt is about ten years older than his wife.

## RAILROADS HUSTLING FOR THE GETTYSBURG BUSINESS

Representatives of the local railroads are hustling to get the Grand Army business that is to move from Nebraska to Gettysburg, Pa., the last of June. There are about 100 veterans who expect to make the trip from Nebraska, and as there is to be no cutting of rates the agent who is the most popular and who can present the best line of argument is likely to get the business.

From Nebraska the Grand Army rate agreed upon to Chicago by the Western Passenger association is 3 cents per mile. From Chicago to Gettysburg and return it is to be 48.50 by the standard and 52 less over the differential line.
